When Foreman was older he moved a few miles away from his father's home and built a house. "It was just one room but I thought it was pretty nice," he recalled, adding that some people there lived in sod houses made of mesquite grass and others lived in a half dugout. This consisted of a hole dug in the ground and lined with boards and sod. Life wasn't entirely austere, however, Foreman reported. "That country had more kinds of fruit than you see around today," he said. "Wild grapes grew along the river and we made wine. There were plums much bigger than the ones grown here with the help of 100 pounds of fertilizer. "We produced all our own food," he continued. "We grew most everything," adding that he had walked may a mile behind a plow digging up the sod.

"When an animal was killed we hung the hindquarters in the cellar to avoid flies," he said, "and it would cure and really dry out. Some people the feet wouldn't go."
