

Notre Dame next for unbeaten Brother Rice

Birmingham Brother Rice, the state's number two Class A football power, combined a strong defensive effort with a crunching running attack Friday night to post an 18-0 shutout of Detroit De LaSalle.

The Warriors, who notched their sixth straight victory of the season, rolled up 269 yards on the ground while limiting the Pilots to just 40 yards of total offense.

"Last week we put a lot of points up on the board," said Rice head coach Al Fracassa, "but tonight, the game belonged to the defense. LaSalle is a

fine ballclub and it took an all-out defensive effort for us to win." After a scoreless first quarter, quarterback Don Hendricks capped a 55 yard drive with a one yard sneak with seven minutes remaining in the first half.

K.C. RYAN's kick for the point after was wide to the right and the Warriors led 6-0.

The defensive promptly forced the Pilots to punt and the Warriors drove from their own 21 yard line to De LaSalle's 28 before Mike Girsks picked off a Hendricks pass at the Pilots' five yard line with only 35 seconds re-

maining in the half.

K.C. Ryan intercepted on first down at the Rice 48, but time ran out before the Warriors could put any more points on the board.

Brother Rice took the opening kickoff of the second half and marched 76 yards in 14 plays to take a 12-0 lead. Running back Mike Cullen, who picked up 58 yards in eight carries during the drive scored the touchdown on a two yard burst up the middle.

THE ATTEMPT for a two-point conversion failed.

In the closing minutes of the third period, the Pilots finally crossed midfield when Mike Girsks recovered a

Cullen fumble on the Warriors 48 yard line.

But the Rice defense rose to meet the challenge. On three successive plays they dumped Pilot runners for a total of 28 yards in losses.

Midway through the final period, Dan MacLean intercepted a De LaSalle pass and returned it to the Pilot 20 yard line. A 15 yard pass from Hendricks to end Curtis Griffin gave the Warriors a first down at the five.

TED FOX scored on the next play and the defense put the finishing touches on the shutout.

Mike Cullen led the Warrior rushing attack with 87 yards in 19 carries.

Fox and Mark Warner contributed 75 and 63 yards respectively.

"De LaSalle split its ends wide to stop our outside game and consequently, our backs found good holes between our tackles," said Fracassa.

"LaSalle has fine size in its defensive line and I thought that our offensive line did a fine job of blocking," he added.

FRACASSA SINGLED out defensive linemen Kevin Hart, Dave Zatkoff and Karl Goebel as well as linebacker K.C. Ryan for their outstanding defensive play.

"Strong defensive play can win a lot of games for a team and I thought that our defensive line put pressure on De LaSalle all night long," Fracassa said.

The victory by the Warriors sets the stage for next Saturday night's Catholic League showdown at Birmingham Groves with Central Division rival Harper Woods Notre Dame which is also undefeated on the season.

The winner of that game will play in the Catholic League first division playoff and will probably face Dearborn Divine Child, the state's number one rated and class B powerhouse.

Knights rebound - beat slumping Rochester Adams

The Adams Highlanders put on its best offensive show of the year, yet still lost to Bloomfield Hills Lahser Friday, 42-28.

The Highlanders gained 306 total yards but yielded 22 points in the first quarter in being humiliated by the Knights.

Adams received the opening kickoff but were unable to move on its first series and were forced into a punting

situation. Lahser started its first series at the Adams 46 yard line and it took them only 2:07 and four plays to send a large homecoming crowd to its feet with a quick score.

SENIOR QUARTERBACK Jon Campian threw a 30 yard scoring strike to Chuck Herbst on a third and seven. Herbst booted the extra point and the Knights had a 7-0 lead.

Adams took the ensuing kickoff but on the first play from scrimmage

John Bailey fumbled and Lahser recovered.

This gave the Knights possession at the Adams 22 and just three plays later Mark Marotto scored on a 10 yard jaunt to put Lahser ahead 13-0. Marotto also ran for the extra points and the Highlanders found themselves down 13-0.

After the kick-off, Adams unsuccessfully tried to get back on track. Once again the extra point attempt failed.

fumbled and Steve Watts pounced on top of it for Lahser.

THIS PUT THE Knights on their own 46 and on the very first play, Campian threw a pass to Kurt Doolin which covered the 54 yards for another Lahser score. The extra point kick by Herbst upset the lead to 22-0.

The second quarter saw Adams get on the board as Kirk Durham eluded a 12 play, 68 yard drive with a five yard run to cut the lead to 22-6. Durham tried to do the same on the extra point but failed and the 16 point lead stood.

It took Lahser until eight minutes into the second quarter to score again. Marotto ran 24 yards right up the gut of the Adams line. Herbst once again added the extra point and the Knights led 29-6.

Late in the second quarter Adams started another drive which started at its own 30. On second down Bailey ran for eight yards to give the Highlanders first and ten at their own 41. Fred Schimon's seven yard run was sandwiched in between two incomplete passes and Schimon had to punt with 1:35 left in the half. His 43 yard punt was converted into a Lahser turnover as the officials ruled that the Lahser player touched the ball and Adams took over at the 10.

TWO PLAYS LATER Durham scored his second touchdown from 10 yards away to cut the lead to 29-12 as the extra point attempt failed.

Schimon then tried an inside kick. But he tried a little too hard as he embarrassingly took a swing and a miss at the ball. It was ruled the Knights ball at the Adams 40 and they would try to put it in one more time before the half.

On the first play Campian found Herbst wide open and hit him easily for a 40 yard scoring pass. Lahser tried to add insult to injury by going for two but Campian's pass was incomplete. The half ended with Lahser holding a 35-12 lead.

In the second half the Highlander of-

fensive attack was nothing short of awesome but it was evident that it was too little, too late. The Adams backfield combination of Schimon and Bailey went to work grinding out valuable yardage and running over Lahser players.

BUT THE SECOND half still saw Lahser score first as Campian burst into the endzone from the one to end an 11 play-80 yard scoring drive.

Campian had a big pass in this series as he hit Doolin with a 31 yard aerial midway through the drive to put the Knights at the Adams 21.

For Campian, it ended a night that every quarterback dreams of as he passed for three touchdowns and ran for another. He gained 180 yards in the air and 43 on the ground.

Trailing 42-12, the Highlanders didn't roll over and play dead. Adams took the Lahser kick-off and went 69 yards in a drive which was all Bailey and Schimon. Bailey capped it off with a 2 yard run for the touchdown. Schimon ran in the extra points and the Adams deficit was 42-20.

WITH CAMPAN out, Lahser could not muster a score the rest of the way. Adams wasn't through and late in the game, had another drive end in a Bailey touchdown.

This time it was a five yard run and Schimon again took in the extra points. The drive covered 87 yards, with the backfield duo getting 60 of them.

But neither Bailey and Schimon, nor 19 first downs, nor 75 offensive plays was enough on this night as the Knights were the victors, 42-28.

Lahser ended up with 337 total yards, 192 of them passing. Bailey ended the evening with 72 yards rushing, while Schimon bulled his way for 121.

Adams will play its next game at home as it hosts Birmingham Groves next Saturday at Rochester Community field. Game time is 2 p.m.

Lahser, now 3-3, will travel to Utica Eisenhower next Friday for an 8 p.m. game.

Southfield club opens

The Southfield Judo-Karate Club opened its doors recently with a grand opening party and judo-karate demonstration.

Southfield city council president Steve Hurtt officiated at ribbon cutting ceremonies for the club, located at 2905 Evergreen.

In addition to judo and karate, the club offers Lebanese belly dancing lessons. Judo lessons are offered for those eight years of age and up with a minimum age requirement of 13 for karate lessons. There is no age requirement for belly dancing lessons.

Judo is taught at the club by Seiji Araki, a fifth degree black belt in Judo who was a three time All Japan champion.
