

2 men found guilty in murder of officer

District attorneys in two Wisconsin counties are preparing murder charges against Gordon L. Stockenauer and Joseph A. Molinari after their conviction Monday on first-degree murder charges stemming from the shooting death of a Troy police officer last spring.

After deliberating for a little more than an hour Monday afternoon, an Oakland County Circuit Court jury returned a guilty verdict against Stockenauer and Molinari for the murder of P.I. Martin Chivas April 22.

In returning the guilty verdict, the jury ignored defense claims that Molinari should be found not guilty by reason of insanity and that Stockenauer was not guilty because he was an unwilling accomplice in the murder of Chivas and two other persons.

Molinari and Stockenauer escaped from a prison farm near Marquette April 19 and were captured near Flint April 22, about six hours after Chivas' death. They have also been accused of murdering a woman hostage and a gas station attendant in Wisconsin

April 21. During the trial, which lasted three weeks, Molinari admitted shooting Chivas when the officer approached a gas station in Troy where the two escapees were attempting to steal a car.

WISCONSIN AUTHORITIES are preparing to extradite Stockenauer and Molinari after they receive a mandatory life sentence from Judge Robert B. Webster Nov. 1.

In statements to police after his capture, Molinari described how he shot two hostages to death hours after the two men walked away from a minimum security farm at the State House of Correction and Branch Prison at Marquette. Stockenauer and Molinari were serving sentences for felonious assault at the time of their escape.

Killed were Mrs. Charlene Beaudin, a Marquette housewife, and Kenneth Kasprzyk, a Milwaukee service station attendant. Mrs. Beaudin was killed near Oshkosh, Wis.

Robert VanderLoop, an assistant district attorney for Winnebago County, Wis., said his office "is definitely

going to prosecute" Stockenauer and Molinari for Mrs. Beaudin's murder and the attempted murder of a second hostage who escaped. However, officials in Winnebago County (Oshkosh) and Milwaukee County must determine in which jurisdiction Stockenauer and Molinari will be prosecuted first, he said.

IF THE TWO are extradited to Wisconsin and convicted there for the Beaudin and Kasprzyk murders, they then will be returned to Michigan to serve their life sentences for the Chivas killing, said Oakland County Prosecutor L. Brooks Patterson. Persons convicted of first-degree felony murder in Michigan are ineligible for parole, but Stockenauer and Molinari could be pardoned by the governor, he added.

The case took a strange turn Monday when Stockenauer, who claims to have important connections with organized crime, reportedly requested that F. Lee Bailey handle his appeal. Following the verdict, Stockenauer was overheard by observers to ask defense attorney James Lawson "to call Bailey for me."

Bailey, a nationally famous criminal defense attorney, was unavailable for comment this week.

The escape and killings received nationwide publicity. In August, when Stockenauer and Molinari were unsuccessfully arguing for a change of venue for the Chivas trial, a pulp detective magazine carried a story called "Murder Breaks Out," in which the two convicts were described as making "a swath as wide as the Grim Reaper" during their three-day flight.

In March, one month before his escape, Stockenauer was featured in a "Time" magazine story on "behavior modification" classes for so-called model prisoners at Marquette.

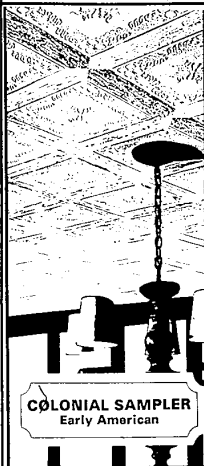
