Department sponsors jobs

Approximately \$80,000 will be granted to Michigan as part of a \$1,683,270 U.S. Department of Labor program to train the jobless and disadvantaged in 13 states.

Secretary of Labor Peter J. Brennan announced that the National Tool, Die and Precision Machining Association will subcontract among its member shops from a one-year contract with the department.

Trainees, recruited through apprenticeship outreach projects and local employment service offices, will receive 18 weeks of on-the-job training and 12 weeks of classroom instruction as tool and die makers, precision machinists and mold makers.

Council approves code changes

burner code as part of the BOCA basic building code.

For all five ordinances the council introduced amendments which would appoint the city's board of zoning appeals to serve as its construction board of appeals.

It also proposed a fee schedule for permits and inspections and established penalty provisions of up to \$500

fine or 90 days in jail, or both, for violation of the code. City Manager Robert Deadman explained that the state has 60 days to review the amendments.

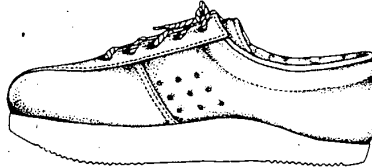
After the state receives input from other cities, Farmington may not get the exact amendment that it requested, but it may be something that is acceptable, Deadman said.

When the council first considered

the ordinances and amendments at its Oct. 7 meeting, Deadman said that although the city may know what is in the state basic building code as it exists at present, it cannot know what may be in the code next year or what changes the State Capitol Construction Code Commission may make in the years to come.

The amendments are expected to be adopted at the next council meeting No. 4.

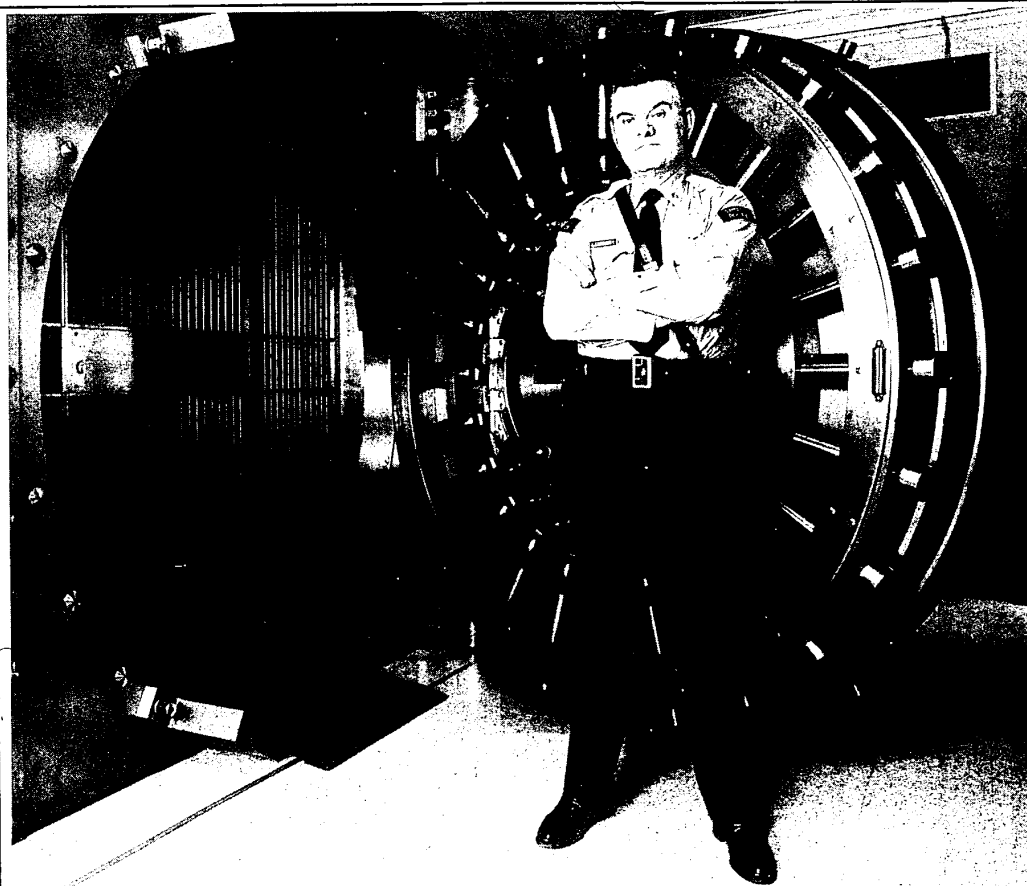
