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## Council approves code changes

burner code as part of the BOCA basic building code. For all five ordinances the council introduced amendments which would appoint the city's board of zoning ap-peals to serve as its construction board of appeals,

It also proposed a fee schedule for permits and inspections and estab-lished penalty provisions of up to \$500

fine or 90 days in jail, or both, for vio-lations of the code. City Manager Robert Deadman ex-planed that the state has 60 days to review the amendments.

After the state receives input from other cities, Farmington may not get the exact amendment that it requested, but it may be something that is acceptable, Deadman said.



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
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
