## SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS REGULAR MEETING COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS OCTOBER 14, 1974

The Council of the City of Farmington Hills met at its regular meeting, October 14, 1974, at City Hall. The meeting was called to order at 8:00 P.M. by Chairman Fred Lichtman. Present were Council Members Keith Deaton, Joan Dudley, Fred Lichtman, Earl Oppenheimer and Margaret Schaeffer. Absent were Councilmen McConnell and Ortman.

The request of the Farmington Public School District for consideration of bi-annual school tax collection was placed on the agenda for October 28, 1974. Petitions received from 61% of the residents of Normandy Hills Subdivision for road improvements were held pending clarification of the status of water supply system petitions.

The Council authorized the installation of two high-intensity flashing signals at appropriate locations on Shawassaw Road adjacent to the elementary school, to indicate a 25 MPH speed limit during peak hours of pedestrian activity, and to arrange with the School District for the manual control and maintenance of such units.

The City staff submitted a report on the revised plans for the development of Walden Park. The Parks Commission was reactivated and will confer directly with residents in the area who reported incidence of disorderly conduct of persons congregating in or near the park facilities. The appointments of Parks Commission members Robert Beauchamp, Dorothy Cox, Betty Frankel, Jack Leitch and Herman Moelmann were approved, terms to expire June 30, 1975. An emergency ordinance was approved changing the hours of operation of city parks to provide for an earlier curfew.

Necessity and cost estimate hearings for sewer improvement in Grand Gardens Subdivision (Grayling Street) were rescheduled to October 28, 1974, 7:30 P.M. at the City Hall.

Resolution #2, setting date for necessity hearing November 18, 7:30 P.M. relative to road improvement in Subdivisions #1 and #4, Meadowbrook Hills, was unanimously adopted.

A hearing before the Council on the elusion option request, Site Plan #16-1973, was granted, as provided by statute, to Superstein & Associates at December 16, 1974, 8:00 P.M. at City Hall; the property in question is located on the west side of Drake Road between Thirteenth and Fourteenth Mile Roads.

Permission was granted to the Farmington Area Jaycees for use of a vacated building on Orchard Lake Road, north of 12 Mile opposite the Old Orchard Theatre, for the 7th annual "Haunted House," October 24 thru 30, 1974.

The existing Building Ordinance was readopted on an emergency basis and a permanent Building Ordinance was introduced subject to enactment at the regular Council meeting, October 28, 1974. This action was taken to exempt the City from the State Construction Code which becomes effective November 6, 1974.

The Council adopted a resolution concerning Halloween activities which banded on vandalism, urging all parents to keep youngsters at home on Devil's Night and asking young people to respect the property of others at all times.

Contract for the codification of City Ordinances, as required by the Charter, was awarded to Louis Andrews of Ann Arbor in the amount of \$5,500.

The Council unanimously extended the City Manager's contract until July 1, 1975. Mayor Lichtman and Councilman McConnell were delegated to participate in the All-America Cities competition in San Diego November 17-20, 1974, following selection of Farmington Hills as one of 21 national finalists. Reimbursement for expenses not to exceed \$500 each was authorized.

The City Manager was directed to arrange a joint meeting with the Council of the City of Farmington for the consideration of mutual projects, including senior citizens and the Council of the Arts.
