## Astrologer warns: beware of October

There may be a few bright spots in 1975, but beware of October. The economy, the weather, everything will be bad... we may even get involved in a war.

It was time for Edward J. Pintar to put all his charts together and give us his annual peek into the future. The Beverly Hills astrology buff says October will be one of the low spots in a three-year down cycle of the economy.

"It'll be real bad. If we didn't have the safeguards that we have today, it would be as bad as the depression in 1929."

"But bank deposit insurance, food stamps, the welfare programs will see us through it," he continued. "There shouldn't be any headlines."

Pintar loves to explain his findings and isn't too modest to talk about his correct predictions.

"I hit that right on the button," he said of his warning about the economic downswing that began last April. "This down cycle is going to continue until August of 1977. Then a boom will start. And it's real good."

**SPEAKING AGAIN** of October 1975, Pintar said he's afraid we might get involved in a war. "But I'm not good enough to pinpoint where the war might be."

Another bad thing about October will be the weather. "We'll set new records for cold."

Pintar confines his astrological findings primarily to the weather and to the economy "because I've always loved to garden and I invest in the stock market."

On the weather scene for 1975 Pintar predicts:

• A mild winter somewhat like 1974. There won't be any major snowstorms "like the kinds that tie up everything."

• April will be a miserable weather month—lots of rain and a cold spell between the 15th and 15th. "This could hurt early crops and fruit buds."

• May will be so beautiful that "people will hurry out to start their gardens. It will be one of the high points of the year. But a cold spell the first part of June will be bad for the early-planted crops."

• July and August will be good growing months with lots of rain. A good year for crops that survived the cold snap.

• Very early frost in September, followed by the "bad October."

• The rest of the year will be pleasant, "weatherwise."

On the economy side, Pintar predicts:

• January will be fairly stable. "That will probably be the only time of the year to take a profit on the market."

• Market will continue down with a low in April, then fluctuate up and down until the bad time in October.

• Things will look better the last two months of the year.

**PINTAR ADMITS** to being "over 70" and enjoys plotting out the future and explaining his findings.

He retired from the grocery business in 1946. "After that I started into the stock market and everything I bought went down... drastically."

"I ran across a book an astrologer had written. He'd plotted the major planets from 1900 to 1940. That's when

I started plotting, and it worked perfectly for me," he said.

Pintar and his wife moved to Beverly Hills in 1954 and started making his annual predictions in 1957.

By following his own findings, Pintar says his stock market activities have been successful. "I don't want to give any kind of impression that we're rich or anything like that. We just exist pleasantly."

Just how accurate are Pintar's predictions?

"When I look over what I said would happen this year, I've come so close it scares me," he said.



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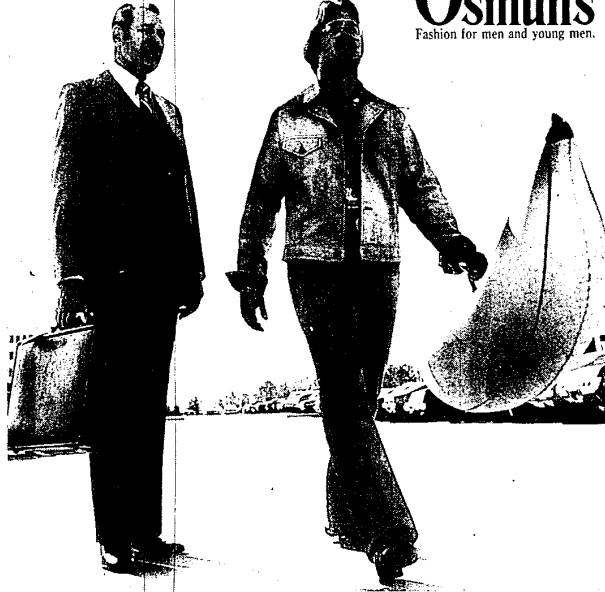
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## Military Service
