Township police will show a video tape of areas which have been designated as dangerous for students traveling to school.


The PTSA committee was formed following complaints of parents in the Walnut Lake Elementary School to the board of education that their children were placed in hazardous situa-

tions getting to school along busy roads in areas where busing is not provided.

"A STUDY of Transportation for Safety Exceptions" was requested by the board of education in September. The study points out that 29 areas within the school district have been cited in past years in parental requests for transportation.

A total of 712 students reside in the areas named. The board has not discussed the issue since the safety study was distributed Nov. 1.
