Mr. John Borth and Mrs. Betty Arnold, representatives from the Farmington Area Advisory Council made a presentation to the Council outlining their revised table of organizational structure and a quarterly report as to their projects and activities.

Minutes of other boards were received and filed.

The City of Farmington has agreed to certify one-half of the total school taxes for operating purposes of the School District before June 1 of each year to allow the School District to collect one-half of the school taxes due at the same time the city's summer tax is collected.

City Manager Deanna reported the Oakland County Department of Equalization has notified the City Assessor that the City of Farmington is presently 8% under-assessed, which means that a factor of 1.08 will be established for the City of Farmington, unless the city adjusts individual properties, thereby increasing the total community's assessed value by 8%.
