

AAUW honors Mary Hurd

The Farmington Branch of the American Association of University Women has chosen Mary Hurd as its honoree during the month of March in observance of International Women's Year.

The program seeks to focus on the advancement of women in all fields, and each month the AAUW will give tribute to one of its members.

Mrs. Hurd is being honored for her accomplishments in the field of business, industry and labor.

MRS. HURD IS A STAFF engineer for the American Concrete Institute, a Detroit-based technical association devoted to gathering and publishing information on concrete design and construction.

She is a member of the local AAUW, a senior member of the So-

ciety for Technical Communication, a member of the American Society of Civil Engineers, the American Civil Liberties Union, and a fellow of the American Concrete Institute. Recently she completed a one-year term as chairman of the Concrete Improvement Board of Detroit.

She assumes these responsibilities and activities with a casual aplomb that comes across as great credibility. Although believing in women's rights, she is not militant. Most of her career has been spent working with men, and a mutual respect has evolved over the years.

HER PRINCIPAL responsibilities at the American Concrete Institute port a regular review of technical papers prepared by volunteer committees, writing, rewriting and editing in support of committee efforts; answering technical inquiries by telephone and by mail; and speaking on concrete and formwork before groups of engineers, construction people, suppliers, concrete technologists and architects. She has also written magazine feature articles on concrete construction and technology as an avocation.

Plans are currently under way for a revised fourth edition.

Mrs. Hurd has three children by her previous marriage: Ralph, 25, Denise, 21, and Hollie, 15.

She enjoys good music especially Wagner, and through membership in the Founders Society at the Detroit Institute of Art, she keeps her Farmington Hills home supplied with a succession of prints and original art from the institute's rest galleries.

In addition, she grows plants both within and outside the home. The lot has been left in its natural state so that whatever comes up, short of a few unsightly weeds is nurtured with uncommon fondness. There were wild strawberries and a fine crop of puffball mushrooms this past season.
