School buses log high mileage

School buses in the state traveled more than the distance from the earth to the sun, or nearly 200 round trips to the moon, transporting children to public schools during the 1973-74 academic year, the State Board of Education has reported.

A total of 11,182 buses carried 880,418 pupils daily a combined distance of 95,317,964 miles, the report shows.

Oakland County schools logged the highest total of miles traveled, using 977 buses to transport 109,081 students 7,382,008 miles. Kalamazoo County schools were second and Keweenaw County Schools in the Upper Peninsula logged the lowest total.

Contributing heavily to the Oakland County totals were the Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills school districts.

Sixty-three 66-passenger buses and 13 special education buses carrying from eight to 32 pupils each traveled 578,186 miles in the Birmingham School District in the 1973-74 academic year, transportation director James V. O'Neil said.

In Bloomfield Hills, transportation director Irving Menucci reported 13 buses with a capacity of 73 students and 39 others carrying 66 passengers traveled a total of 371,156 miles.
