

# Detroit's Cobo Hall Awarded 1971 ABC Tournament

## AROUND THE SPORTS WORLD IN BRIEF FORM.

The nation's greatest bowlers are coming back to the Detroit area.

But it won't be until 1971 when the annual ABC Tourney is housed at Cobo Hall.

Upwards of 5,000 will vie in the competition which will be staged over a two-month period. It will mark the second time the bowlers have held the ABC at Cobo.

## White Youth Faces Job Barriers

NEW YORK -- The Government's emphasis on finding summer jobs for poor Negro youths has put the squeeze on young whites.

But a pinch on both white and Negro job applicants was indicated by the state employment office in New York City, which got 20,000 applications for summer work, up from 14,000 a year ago, but had placed only 2,000.

a department store manager in Charleston, W. Va., said that publicity on Government programs had even brought out youths who originally had no intention of working this summer.

And in Chicago, a city official noted: "Companies that hired 10 per cent Negroes in years past are now hiring 40 to 50 per cent."

In San Francisco, a bank dropped a summer-job program that formerly accepted mostly white youths and launched a new drive that brought 40 minority-group youths.

In Rochester, Minn., the Mayo Clinic, IBM and other employers imported 30 ghetto youths from the Twin Cities, leading to complaints that white youths were left jobless.
