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Prices up

Girl Scout cookies go on sale Jan. 25

Junior, Cadette and Senior Scouts in South Oakland County will be taking orders for Girl Scout cookies the week

of January 25-February 1. The time is a little different, the price is too, but this year more than ever before, selling 274,300 boxes of cookies is a crucially important goal for Southern Oakland Girl Scouts, Inc.

In 1973, 30 percent of the Council's total operating costs came from cookie sale profits. Now, in 1975, with dollars received from United Funds, council fund raising campaigns and camping programs all having less purchasing power, Southern Oakland will realize an even greater financial gap that must be met by cookie sale profits.

THE PROBLEM is compounded this year by the fact that an emergency 10 cent surcharge was put on each box of cookies by all cookie companies in early December. Thus, in order to achieve the projected council profit, more boxes will have to be sold than anticipated in order to provide the same services that volunteers have received in the past, not to mention new or expanded services. Council profits from the sale currently provide varied programs opportunities plus well maintained camp facilities and equipment for nearly 18,000 girls served during the year in South Oakland County.

Five different flavors of cookies can be ordered for \$1.25 per box. They include: assorted sandwich, chocolate chip, mint, peanut butter, sandwich and shorties. Scouts will collect money when cookies are delivered during Girl Scout Week, March 10-15.

For the second year the cookie sale will be co-chaired by Arlene Hoorout of Birmingham and Chris Judd of Royal Oak.

Area sales managers who are assisting the co-chairmen are Norma Greeley representing the Farmington and Novi communities and Ida Habin representing the Southfield and Lathrup communities.
