 A national accredited amateur flower show judge, she is heading plans for an exhibition of table settings and arrangements which will be in all Hudson's stores in the area.  
 Before she and her husband, Walter, and their four sons moved to Michigan, they had lived in various cities in Ohio where Mrs. Dolan was active in school and youth activities.
