Murphy to name deputy executive

OAKLAND COUNTY—County Executive Daniel Murphy said he expects to announce some of his choices for the top posts in his new administration before next week.

Murphy said one of the announcements will likely be his choice for deputy county executive—the prison who will serve as Murphy's second-in-command.

will serve as muspuy a second mand. The position, which Murphy can fill without anyone's approval, will go to a Republican, a man, and someone hard outside the county's current payroll. LAST WEEK the Oakland County Board of Commissioners approved the nare top positions created by Mur-phy's reorganization plan Commissioners must approve Mur-phy's choices in only six of these posi-tions: those chosen to head Murphy's superdepartments

The county executive has complete

control of who will serve as public in-formation officer (or press secre-tary), administrative assistant for mi-nority affairs, and, most importantly, the depaty county executive. With an approved base salary of \$33.500 the first year, the depaty exec-utive will be the 10th highest paid em-ploye on the county payroll. Only two elected officials, the county executive and the county prosecutor, receive more.

MURPHY SAID he has narrowed

MURPHY SAID he has narrowed the candidates for deputy executive to 15-20 names integrity, an administrative background, and political compatibility will be important factors in his final choice. Murphy said "He will obviously be a Republican." Murphy said "I don't intend to him eanybody who won't be supportive of my programs." Murphy said he hoped to have all nue positions filled before the end of February

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS last week gave Murphy the authority to spend as much as \$250,000 to pay his new administrators' salaries, although

Murphy assured them he should only have to spend \$100,000 of that amount. However, Murphy's inability to guar-artee that the figure wouldn't go high-er led to substantial opposition, al-most entirely from Democratic com-missioners.

AT LEAST one Republican commissioner joined the Democrats in asking for a more reliable estimate Commissioner Richard Wilcon (R-1). of Orthwille, wanted Murphicopuest for him new positions to be sent to committee for extended discussion.

"I would like to know if Murphy can do it for \$100,000." Wilcox said "I think Murphy should substântiate a latte more."

The majority, however, was willing

to trust that Marphy wouldn't spend more than necessary.

MURPHY, WIBO again this week and he wouldn't guarantee that the cost wouldn't exceed \$100.00, and he hopes to keep costs down by hiring current county employes to the new posts whenever-possible.

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Banks to resolve tax controversy

Dr. Fred '9 Thorn, superintendent of Bloomfield Hills Schools, said Tuesday he had been working with officials from a number of banks which had asked mortgagors to deposit additional sums of money in their escrowater accounts as a result of twice-party tax collections. SOME SMALLER banks may be

able to do this immediately but larger ones will take longer, perhaps as much as six months, he predicted "I would advise people to check with their banks as to when they will be able to do this." Thorin said. He is contacting all major banks in the area and also met on Monday with Rep. James Defebaugh (R-45). See Ibonald Bishop (R-4) and Dr. Donald Peckeripaugh, superintendent of Birmingham's Schools.

Defebaugh is a member of the house banking committee and Bishop is a member of the senate banking committee in the Michigan legislature.

"I hope by the end of the week to have a list of all the banks that are going to cooperate in terms of this usuque problem." Thorin said.

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
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
