Resident studies at Israeli university

Larry Sklar, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Sklar, 30900 Clubhouse Lane, Farmington Hills, is spending his junior year at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, Israel.

Majoring in both Hebrew and psychology at Wayne State University, Sklar is studying the sources of Jewish traditions.

After completing his BA at Wayne, he plans to attend graduate school in Jewish education. He is studying modern Hebrew, Jewish thought and Jewish history at the Hebrew University and also studies traditional Jewish sources (the Bible and Jewish Law) at a yeshiva, or rabbinical academy, in Jerusalem.

"Being here you receive a very different impression of Jewish history and tradition. Israel brings things all together," he said.

"There are echoes of ancient Israel everywhere. For example, some kibbutzim (collective settlements) observe the ancient agricultural laws that have lain dormant for 1,900 years. You see and touch sights you only heard about back home."

He did not go to Israel to study the modern state, but has found opportunity to understand the situation in Israel the year after the Yom Kippur War.

"One problem is that so much time and money have been spent on security worries," he said. "The standard of living suffers. The social areas suffer. But as long as Israeli leaders share traditional Jewish values I'm sure there will be a concentrated effort to clear up social problems as soon as the security problems are stabilized."

Sklar is one of more than 450 overseas students on the One-Year Program at the Hebrew University, Israel's largest institution of higher learning.

Since it opened in 1925, the university has been involved in the development of Israel and the training of its leaders and professionals.

"In both American and Russia, the Jews are represented in the middle class and also among the intellectual and cultural pacesetters," Sklar said.

"Here the Jews comprise the entire social spectrum from the garbage collectors to the prime minister. The most important part of being here is being here—just living in a country populated by Jews and run by Jews."

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2 injured in crash

WEST BLOOMFIELD—A Birmingham man remained in critical condition Tuesday following an accident in West Bloomfield Township in which he and his wife were injured.

Dr. Gerald Gorman, 59, and Sonya Gorman, 44, of Birmingham, were taken to Botsford Hospital, Farmington, in critical condition after an accident reported at approximately 7:30 p.m. Saturday night.

On Tuesday, Gorman remained in critical condition. A hospital spokesman said Mrs. Gorman's condition was improving.

Christine Gibavitch, 24, also involved in the two car accident, was taken to Pontiac General Hospital but was subsequently released. Her address was not given to West Bloomfield Township police.

The Gorman's 1974 Volvo was struck while traveling west at the 14 Mile and Farmington Road intersection in West Bloomfield Township. Ms. Gibavitch was traveling north on Farmington Road.

Ms. Gibavitch stood mute at the arraignment before 48th District Court Judge Gus Cifelli Monday on charges of failing to stop at a scene of a personal injury accident.

Bond was set at \$1,000 cash surety. An examination date before Judge Carl Ingraham has been set for Feb. 11.

West Bloomfield and Farmington Hills Police Departments and the Farmington Hills Fire Department responded to the accident call.
