
SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS Special Meeting of the CITY COUNCIL January 20, 1975

A special meeting of the Council of the City of Farmington Hills was conducted at City Hall on the 20th day of January, 1975. Present were Mayor Lichtman and Councilmembers Keith Deacon, Joan Dudley, Robert McConnell, Earl Oppenheimer and William Orman. Mayor Lichtman proclaimed the week of January 26 to February 1, 1975 as "JUNIOR ACHIEVEMENT WEEK" and asked for the support and encouragement of the community for this worthwhile program.

PUBLIC HEARINGS AND INTRODUCTION OF AMENDATORY ORDINANCES
Ordinance No. C-62-8, to rezone 15 acres located on the south side of 12 Mile between Farmington and Drake Roads, from RA-1 Residential to OS-1A Office was unanimously introduced.
Ordinance No. C-62-9, to rezone 6 acres located on the south side of 12 Mile between Farmington and Drake Roads from RA-1 to OS-1A Office, was unanimously introduced.
Ordinance No. C-62-10, to rezone 12 acres located on the south side of 12 Mile Road between Farmington and Drake Roads from RA-1 to OS-1A Office, was unanimously introduced.
A request to vacate the northerly 80 feet of Bond Street from the easterly side of Greenboro to the westerly side of Ardmore, subject to any existing easements for public utilities or sewer, submitted by Oakland Subdivision was denied following a public hearing with a vote of 5 to 0, abstention by McConnell.
Ordinance No. C-62-11, to rezone property in Supervisor's Plat of Westhill Woods Sub., owned by the Farmington Elks Lodge and Westhill Medical Clinic lots 27 and 28 from RC-2 Multiple to OS-1 Office and lots 29-32 from RC-2 Multiple to OS-1 Office, was introduced on a vote of 4 to 0, abstentions by Orman and McConnell.
Meeting was adjourned at 9:45 P.M.
