## Hills police report clearing up burglary ring

FARMINGTON HILLS—Police made substantial progress last week on 16 unsolved crimes.

Four juvenile members of a burglary ring were arrested and a fifth was expected to be arrested shortly as a result of a break which came Wednesday evening, Feb. 5.

Police received a call from Philip Margolis, 3352 Heritage Lane, saying he suspected someone was upstairs in his home.

He and his wife had just returned from a visit to a funeral home. They noticed fresh footprints around the house, someone lying when they drove up and the front door ajar. They went inside and heard noises upstairs.

Five unmarked cars, one only a block from the Margolis home, were cruising the northern area of the city and immediately answered the call.

Police, upon entering the home, ap-

prehended one youth in the upstairs bedroom.

FURTHER INVESTIGATION led to the arrest of the others, all local residents 13 to 15.

Farmington Hills Public Safety Director Ronald Holko said it appears the youths have committed 14 break-ins and one attempted break-in in the northern part of the city.

At this point police estimate they

have recovered \$1,200 to \$2,000 worth of stolen goods—bongo drums, snare drums, a coin collection, cameras, radios and watches. They are being inventoried at the police station. Police expect to add to the list as more items, which were sold, are recovered.

Two men, Thurman Smith, 22, of Pontiac and Gregory Andrew Styles, 24, of Pontiac have been arrested and charged with armed robbery of

Schroeters Flowers on Jan. 21. Styles and Smith were arraigned. Bond for both was set at \$25,000.

THE SUSPECTS allegedly entered the florist shop 2216 Orchard Lake posing as customers ordering flowers for a wedding.

Shop owner Donna Schroeter and employee Martha Koch were bound with adding machine cord and adhesive tape. The thieves left after taking

\$150 from the victims' purses and the cash drawer. They were released by mailman Joe Furr and Ms. Schroeter called police.

Thomas Ray Jaffray, 17, of Detroit has been charged with attempting to break into Paris Place, 1014 Farmington Road, on Jan. 25. A vehicle also has been apprehended.

Jaffray was arraigned before District Court Judge Michael Hand and stood mute. Bond was set at \$10,000.
