mood for his 35 minute opening statement.
Dean immediately addressed himself to those students who objected to his appearance on the Rochester campus. "I'm in debt," stated Dean. "During my 16 months of cooperating with the government and my four months in jail, I fell deeper and deeper in debt."

ADMITTING HIS CONCERN over the student discontent, Dean told of a statement of cancellation he prepared two weeks ago and carries in his briefcase. "A week ago I had decided to forget the whole thing, and I may cancel out at any moment."

After qualifying his position regarding the propriety of his college lectures, Dean got to the business at hand. "Let's talk a little about Watergate now."
The first problem in discussing "Watergate" is to define the word, Dean said. Dean related his experience in randomly calling 20 persons from the Los Angeles phone directory. The responses were as varied as would be expected, but three key words surfaced in nearly every one them: corruption, scandal and sadness.
Dean's own definition was "corruption tied in with power, the corrupt use of power for political purposes by government officials—a sad litany of events."

The next question proposed by Dean was: "Why the break in of the Democratic National Headquarters in the Watergate complex?" Dean believes that Watergate was an inevitable situation in the Nixon administration.
"They, Nixon and his advisors, were getting bolder and bolder all the time. They had planned to break into Muskie's office and the office of a newspaper editor in Las Vegas."

WHEN DEAN referred to the conspirators he always used the word "they" and never "we," even though he was also found guilty.
Dean pondered the justification of the Watergate tragedy. The attitude at the White House, Dean said, was one of "do it yourself." Dean claimed that this attitude prevailed even after Nixon's re-election a time when Washington was in a state of shock.

"The White House means terms courts, saunas and telephones. It's all very seductive, and it's easy to feel you're important when you're really not."
Dean continued with his self-questioning by asking, "Does power corrupt?"
"Yes it does corrupt, and it's something we've got to be aware of and guard against. This is the lesson of Watergate."

In parting, Dean left the young crowd with a message of advice first given him by his wife and which he later offered the President of the United States. The truth, spoke John Dean, will always emerge.
