Laid-off teachers say board ignores plight

By SERVE MEMORY Pirk-slipped before last June and still not rehited. It tachers from the Farmington school district are sub-stilluing daily to keep one foot in the school system. Soon, they won't even be able to do that Because of Michigan's new unemployment compensation law for temporary workers, the school board has adopted a policy to allow sub-stitutes 12 full weeks of work in the district. After that, they will be called only once a week, if that, to prevent them from attaining the 14 weeks'

THE 10 substituting teachers are protesting the board's policy and calling for a special consideration of their plight

"we just don't think it's fair." said Nancy Klein, one of the pinksipped teachers "We know those kids, we know the school system and we're more familiar with the school build-ing, than any of the new subs would be."
