PATTERSON'S WAS the only non-leadership resolution presented from the convention floor. And if delegates were eager to give Patterson that spe-cial privilege. Patterson made sure to make the most of what was actually a carefully-planned appeal for one of his favorite causes.

Although Patterson continued to in-sist his only immediate political goal was to be re-elected county prose-cutor in 1976, he looked, sounded, acted and was treated like a man ready for promotion. To the delight of delegates. Patter-son offered his long standing criti-cisms of state, parole practices and urged delegates to support his resolu-

tion that persons convicted of violent crimes shouldn't be released from jail will they've served the minimum sen-tence imposed by the courts. According to Patronon, five persons have been killed in the last 20 months in Oakland County at the hands of early jarolese.

REPEATING A statement he's

"We're being raped, robbed and beaten by the same people over and over again. It's time to stop the re-volving door on our penal in-stitutions."

Patterson said the convention re-sponse was personally gratifying and was a clear indication that citizens want something done about the early release of potentially dangerous crimi-rals

However. Patterson described the more than a week's effort he put forth to prepare the convention for his visit and his cause.

PATTERSON PERSONALLY mailed each of the delegates a four-page bjorchure on the parole ssue. at its own expense, let visited each delegation to plug his cause. And a para display was propared for the lobby of the cohvention hall, crammed with newspaper headlines of paroless being arrested and convicted for brutal crimes.

Patterson said he hoped his resolu-tion would encourage state legislators to support a bill sporsored by State Rep. Richard Fessler (R-24), of West Bloomfield. The bill would require the minimum sentence restriction for pris-

"I want to be re-elected county pros-ecutor and to continue doing a good job." Patterson said. "After that, I am prepared to keep my options
