FTD moves to Southfield

Florists' Transworld Delivery (FTD), the floral delivery association, has announced it is moving its international headquarters from Detroit to Southfield.

FTD now is located in its own two-story building on West Lafayette with four of its departments across the street in the State of Michigan Plaza Building on Sixth Street.

The new offices will be on three floors of a four-story building at 2200 Northwestern Highway. Occupancy is set for June 1.

"We deeply regret having to move out of Detroit," FTD executive vice president Hubert J. Beudet said.

The city has been our home for nearly 65 years and we are sorry to leave.

However, after an exhaustive five-year search and the investigation of many alternatives, including sites outside Michigan, our board of directors decided that the best solution for our

needs was to remain in the tri-county area and lease the space on North Western Highway," he said.

FTD is leasing the Southfield space with an option to buy the building. The West Lafayette building will be put up for sale.

Wabeek land sales are up

Land sales at the posh Wabeek development in Bloomfield Hills surpassed \$3.5 million in 1974—a 200 per cent dollar volume increase over the preceding year, according to figures released by Chrysler Wabeek Development Co.

The total represents unit sales of more than 100 home site lots and bulk acreage land parcels at the 80-acre Wabeek development, company president Howard A. Davis said.
