

Donated to Hills

Statue location considered

FARMINGTON HILLS — Two city council members, an architect and the library board will meet soon to choose a site to display the newly acquired statue.

The bronze figure, *Humoresque*, was donated to the city by Dr. Allen Ziegler of Southfield.

Council members Jan Dolan and William Ortmann will meet with architect Stuart McCallum and members of the library board.

In discussing acceptance of the statue, several council members expressed concern about vandalism.

TENTATIVE PLANS call for putting the statue by the Farmington Hills library branch on Twelve Mile Road.

Estimated moving costs are placed

at \$500. Costs for a base and pool setting for the statue have been estimated at \$5,000.

Ziegler, a Botsford Hospital physician, had acquired the statue, which he values at \$35,000, from the estate of E. Fisher of the Fisher Body family.

It is said to be the work of Harriet Frisvold, a student of Rodin.

IN OTHER ACTION, the council set hearings of necessity for installation of sanitary sewers in Grand River Homes subdivision and Fend Farm.

The Grand River Homes project will include 18 lots on Middle Belt Road between Liberty and Shawnee. Estimated cost is \$40,250. A similar project proposed for that area

in 1971 was estimated at \$11,583. Hearing for the proposal is set for 7:30 p.m. March 17.

The Fend Farm project includes 26 lots on Fend Road between Gill and Drake. Cost is estimated to be \$95,900 for the project. A hearing will be at 7:15 p.m. March 17.

The council accepted petitions from 50 per cent of the residents on Greenacres, Sybil Court, Glendenn Court, Greenmeadow Circle West, and East.

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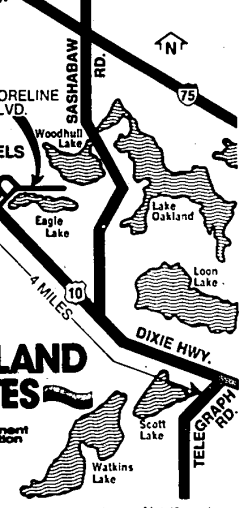
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
