When dummy appeared the shock was eased. The opening lead removed East's honor, the jack cleared dummy's cards, and a spade was ruffed.

Two high clubs followed and a club ruff put the lead in dummy. West won the seventh trick when dummy led the nine of diamonds.

West shifted to a heart, but all he was going to win was three top diamonds. Declarer made nine tricks for a fine score of 116 points. Most North-South pairs got too high.

As South tells the story, he was considering the proper word choice to see if his partner's pass was an imaginative or lucky choice when his partner made an inquiry.

"Why did you make the cue-bid?"

If you had made a take-out double, I could have passed and we would have collected 5 to 800 points."
