2 Israeli students to visit Farmington


Sonia Goren and Tal Band, two high school students in Israel, will visit Farmington High School on Tuesday, March 18, to tell about their life in Israel, about the youth and education in their country.

They will also be available to answer questions from their American counterparts.

The visit is part of a nationwide program which brings, for the third year, high school students from Israel to the United States under the auspices of the Israeli Foreign Office. This year, for the first time, a group of American youth will be traveling to Israel for a similar program.

Sonia is 16 years old and still lives in kibbutz Beit Harenek where she was born, in the Western Galilee near Haifa. In the past year she has been doing voluntary work, helping an underprivileged immigrant family in a new development. When she finished high school, she will go into the Israeli Army for two years. Tal is 18 and a sixth-generation Israeli. His ancestors lived within the walls of Jerusalem and participated in the founding of the new city. His family was one of 60 families which founded Tel Aviv in 1908. He studies in the mathematics-physics faculty and was a member of the editorial committee of his school newspaper.
