

Farmington homeowners council issues city, school questionnaire

FARMINGTON HILLS—The on-again, off-again survey drawn up by the Council of Homeowners Associations is on again.

The revised, longer questionnaire is being circulated among homeowners in the city.

The three-part survey seeks resident opinion regarding the planned residential development (PRD) zoning classification, school millage and the school district's educational system, and several items on the city's charter.

The new survey is considerably longer and more detailed than the original 14-item questionnaire. Concern about the tone and content of the first survey prompted the council's board of directors to invalidate the results and rewrite the questionnaire.

THE FIRST survey, formulated by the council's chairman Richard

Match, had been printed on the council's stationery and circulated but had not received the board's approval.

The new survey doubles the number of questions.

The PRD questions deal with the zoning classification that combines condominium and / or multiple dwellings with single-family residences and requires at least 25 per cent of the development be open space.

The council's position on PRDs urges a moratorium on further approvals until experience with the three already-approved projects proves feasibility.

THE COUNCIL takes a neutral stand regarding the April 29 school millage election and asks residents' opinions about millage, teacher and administrative salaries, fiscal planning, quality of education teacher attitudes and discipline.

The council also seeks residents' opinions on two items that were proposed but not incorporated into the city's charter.

One regards limiting elected city officials to two terms in office and the second asks that any city project estimated to cost more than \$100,000 be submitted for voter approval.

The surveys are being distributed to homeowner associations in the city.
