## Documents available on America's past

"Documents from America's Past," designed to jog your sense of history, is a descriptive listing of historical documents in the National Archives, and printed facsimiles which are available for purchase at low cost.

The booklet was published by the National Archives and Records Service of the General Services Administration. A free copy of the 24-page booklet may be obtained by writing to Consumer Information, Pueblo, Colorado 81009.

One of the booklets listed is "Charters of Freedom," which includes reproductions of the three documents that laid the political foundations of the United States: the Declaration of Independence, the Bill of Rights, and the Constitution of the United States. Also included in the booklet are brief historical notes and pictures of the National Archives Building and the murals in the Exhibition Hall. Posters of the Charters are also available.

The Constitution is reduced to about half the size of the original to permit all four pages on one sheet. The other two documents, the Bill of Rights and the Declaration of Independence, are exact, full-size facsimiles of the texts of the original parchments. They are suitable for framing.

"THE FORMATION of the Union" tells the story of the Constitutional Convention with documents and pages reproduced from the journals of the Congress to illustrate the steps toward independence. Other documents show the work of the Constitutional convention, the process of election that made George Washington our first President, and the protest against the Constitution that led to the adoption of the Bill of Rights.

Included also is George Washington's Inaugural Address of 1789. The publication features an exact facsimile of the text from which the president read, written in his own clear hand. The accompanying five-page historical note describes the first election and discusses the authorship of the text of the address.

**SUMMARY OF REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS FEBRUARY 24, 1973**

A regular meeting of the Council to the City of Farmington Hills was conducted at City Hall on the 24th day of February, 1973, and was called to order at 8:30 P.M. by Mayor Fred Lichtman. Present were Council members Deacon, Delan, Dailey, Lichtman, McClelland, Opperlander and Ottum.

The Council voted unanimously to record their opposition to House Bill 9478 which is in contravention to the provisions of the City Charter pertaining to political activity or candidacy to public office by a city employee.

The City Manager and Director of Finance were authorized to institute the Modified Accrual System Reimbursements as the official accounting system.

The County Road Commission will be asked to review traffic signal warrants for the Eastland/11 Mile Road intersection; updated accident statistics will be submitted.

The following supplementary meeting resolutions were enacted:

1. OC-48-2: Section 24, Grand Gardens Subdivision-Lot 60 from P-1 to L-1; in Lot 60 parcel 91 was removed from RA-4 to L-1; and parcel 92 from RA-4 to P-1; parcel 93 from RA-4 to P-1.
2. OC-48-2: Section 25, Lot 23 of Supervisors Plat 914, removed from RA-1 to OS-1 Office Service.
3. OC-48-2: Section 15, 3 acres located on the west side of Highland Road between Railroad Court and Eleven Mile Road, removed from RA-3 to L-1 Light Industrial.

Proposed text changes in the Zoning Ordinance were reviewed and the Council's recommendations will be forwarded to the Planning Commission.

Dr. Allen Elger's gift to the City of a bronze statue titled "Thoreauverse," was accepted unanimously and a committee was appointed by Mayor Fred Lichtman to consider an appropriate site. The Council also approved the expenditure of not more than \$5,000 for the cost of moving and installation.

The first standard resolution to establish a Special Assessment District for road improvement in Normandy Hills Subdivision for Thoreauville and Chastity, Section 21, was adopted.

Recently hearing for sanitary sewer improvement in Grand River House Subdivision, Lots 1 thru 15, was set for March 17, 1973 at 7:30 P.M.

Recently hearing for sanitary sewer improvement, Supervisors Plat 912, Lot 1, and Supervisors Plat of Pund's Farm, Lots 1-3, was scheduled for March 17, 7:15 P.M.

Petitions for sanitary sewer improvement in Greenacres Subdivision, entered by 80% of the affected property owners, were accepted and the City Engineer was directed to prepare the necessary plans and specifications.

The application for junkyard license renewal for one year from William M. King and Timothy Putnam, 2889 Haggerty Road, was approved on a 4 to 1 vote opposed by Deacon.

Land Fill Permit as requested by Davis & Armstrong, on the west side of Farmington Road, north of 13 Mile Road, was renewed for a period of one year.

Traffic Control Order 91-A, amending weight control restrictions for specified roadway in consideration of seasonal conditions was approved, as submitted by the Traffic Engineer.

Recommendations of the Director of Public Services relative to major road improvements were accepted for further consideration as to specific priorities.

The following Ordinances were introduced:

Building Ordinance OC-9A: To amend certain provisions of the Basic Building Code.

Historical Commission Ordinance OC-N: To establish a Farmington Hills Historical Commission.

Commemorative Ordinance OC-N: To establish a Division of Commemorative within the Department of Public Services.

Permits for fund-raising activities were issued to: (1) Our Lady of Mercy High School, "The Fair" May 3 thru May 4, 1973; and (2) Adat Shalom Synagogue, "The Fair" May 25 thru May 26, 1973. Approvals were granted subject to traffic and maintenance controls.

The City Attorney was authorized to initiate condemnation proceedings for easements as required for the Woodhurst Subdivision sanitary sewer improvement. Meeting adjourned 12:10 A.M.
