Council of Governments (SEMCOG).
According to Leonard and Deadman, both authorities in public safety,
the merger would increase efficiency
and elliminate duplication of facilities
among the three village areas.

They suggested further that the new
system be administered by a joint
committee of representatives from
the respective village councils.

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
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
