

# BRIDGE

Duplicate players are no different from rubber bridge players in their desire to win. Since each deal is played several times, duplicate players are always curious when someone reaches a superior contract which their system does not allow them to bid. This curiosity leads to changes in the game.

West led the five of spades. Notrump bids and responses have been carefully explored. The opening bid is well defined. Consider, however, North's dilemma when he finds South has, at most, three spades.

Three notrump is the winning bid, but suppose South is weak in spades. Now six in a minor is a good contract and three notrump is headed for defeat. Despite science, North has to guess.

South is concerned about the spade lead. He captures East's queen with his ace and now must be sure East wins tricks in a wasteful way.

There is no problem if West is leading, so declarer needs to lead toward his diamond and heart honors. He needs entries to dummy so he lead the club queen and overtakes with the king to lead toward the heart jack.

If East wins, declarer has nine tricks so East plays low. Again declarer enters dummy by overtaking the club 10 with the jack. This preserves the nine as an entry.

Again, when declarer leads toward the diamond queen, East ducks. Declarer cannot claim nine tricks, but declarer switches back to hearts to establish his ninth trick before the defenders have been able to establish their spades.

"My idea," said Reddig, "was for the club to have community identification, displayed in the best possible graphic form."

Club members are unanimous—Farmington area residents will be seeing a lot of the logo in the years ahead.

The club meets monthly at the Farmington public library. While the membership role, more than 100, is full, associate members are welcome.

## Filing deadline set for school election

Interested in running for a Clarenceville School Board seat in the June election?

If you are, get your petitions from the board office at 2800 Eight Mile east of Middle Belt, and file them by the 4 p.m. Monday, May 12, deadline.

The board has two terms expiring with the winners of the four-year terms taking office July 1.

Board incumbents Dr. Samuel Prisk and Thomas Wilson terms expire this summer.

Potential candidates in the Clarenceville or Schoolcraft College board elections may get petitions between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Clarenceville candidates are required to have valid signatures of at least 20 registered voters on petitions while Schoolcraft candidates must have from 30 to 200 signatures filed.

The local board and college board candidates are the only decisions Clarenceville voters have to decide June 9. There are no proposals on the ballot.
