# Cycle shop owner looks at market

**FARMINGTON HILLS**—"They sure  
don't make motorcycles the way they  
used to," said John Peters, manager  
of Superior Cycles.

"Better disc brakes, tires, belted  
grips and electric starters and bright-  
er lights add to the safety and makes  
this vehicle more reliable."

Today's motor cyclists get a six-  
month warranty regardless of mile-  
age covering parts and labor. Old  
models needed an overhaul every  
5,000 to 10,000 miles. Now it's from  
20,000 to 30,000. Kawasaki motorcycles  
run from \$600 to \$2,700 but Peters  
admits that others run up to \$4,000.

Years ago, motorcycles were used  
as a hobby but these days it has be-  
come an economical means of trans-  
portation—coast to coast. One gallon  
is good for 45 to 100 miles. They come  
in better quality and more attractive  
styles.

"Some of the Detroit Tiger play-  
ers are riding our brand because they  
like the design and the performance  
of these machines," Peters said.

People want to get away from traf-  
fic, get out in the fresh air, forget  
their troubles, and experience a great  
sense of freedom, he said.

"Today, bikes make good com-  
muters to and from school. They are  
powerful, smooth and quiet, better en-  
gined to be trouble free, economic-  
al and dependable."

There is no age or sex limit. Middle  
aged women are buying them. They  
take them to the cottage to drive in  
the trails.

To buy one you must be 18 and have  
a license. It is a regular driver's li-

cence with an endorsement for a mo-  
torcycle.

"BOYS IN their early teens come in  
our place daily to look around,"  
Peters said. "Scooters are no longer  
as popular."

"The wheels are too small for good  
handling. They are underpowered and  
have no sufficient braking system."  
Parents can buy them and they can  
ride strictly off the road, he said. One  
of his customers once returned from  
deer hunting in the Upper Peninsula  
and brought with him a deer to show  
me attached to his big 800cc cycle.

Peters, 42, lives with his wife and 2  
children in Farmington Hills. Since  
boyhood, mechanics has been his  
hobby.

He admits that now since the motor-  
cycle business is flowering, he enjoys  
it even more.

"I like to work with that two-  
wheeled vehicle. I sell and service

them, but I enjoy most repairing  
them and making them work prop-  
erly. I derive a great satisfaction from  
it."
