

Farmington will buy 4 police cars

PARMINGTON—The city council accepted a \$13.278 low bid for the purchase of four police cars for its public safety department.

The low bidder, Demeron Motor Sales, Inc. of Farmington, will provide three four-door patrol cars at \$1.211 each and one two-door coupe for detective use at \$1.381. The dealer is allowing \$3.308 for trade-ins.

The city originally planned to buy five patrol cars, but a review of micage on the department's cars showed that two cars in the fleet will not have reached \$4.00 miles by July 1, said City Manager Robert Deadman.


