FR. CUNNINGHAM critizes what he calls the paranoid opposition to getting food to mothers and babies.

"A lack of protein in babies' diets conditions the development of their brain power, and no matter what you do with Headstart, no matter what you do with a better ashool system, you're not going to help this kid if his diet has been bad. He should have been born with a 120 (2); he's got a 105. Or he's got an 80 as the result of real starvation.

"So we pushed into that, and the way we did it was with volunteers. Volunteers pick up the mothers and kids who couldn't get to the food, and we make the existing program work"

Rummage auction planned for May 3




