



Groves outruns Lathrup

Powerful Northern tops Falcons

Farmington High and Southfield-Lathrup are having fine track seasons this spring — but both teams were bound to be losers in their dual meets last Thursday.

Lathrup ran at Birmingham Groves, while Farmington traveled to Pontiac-Northern. Groves and Northern are two of the most powerful Class A teams in the state this season.

"Pontiac Northern is tough this year," said Farmington coach Gerald Young, whose squad was on the short end of a 79-42 score. "Northern beat (Inter Lakes League defending champion) Livonia Stevenson, 77-51, earlier."

Northern won eight of the 15 events. George Washington won the 100-yard dash and the high jump, and Mitch Green won the long jump.

Farmington, 4-4 overall and 2-2 in the H.L. got a first place from Arno Steig (finished the two mile run in 9:57.3, Stuart Glatfelter won the mile run in 4:42.8, and teammate Marty Popp took the pole vault at 12-0).

Groves beat Lathrup, 77-48, in a Metro Suburban Association meet. The Falcons won nine events. "They're tough — they do have some depth," said Lathrup coach Gerald Mineweiser. "But we were right in there. We set three school records."

LATHRUP'S JOHN Harding set one school standard by winning the two mile in 9:39.6. Lathrup's mile relay (Brad Griffin, Steve Sambor, Dave Smith and Mike Driscoll) set another mark with a 3:21.3, also in Farmington. Steve Foley finished second in the mile with a 4:29.4 time, good enough for a record.

Earlier last week, Lathrup beat non-league Waterford Township, 66-37. Bob Goldstein won both hurdles and ran on the winning 400 relay. Lathrup is 5-1 overall this season.

In a Northwest Suburban League meet last Thursday, Thornton High defeated North Farmington, 62-30. Thornton was led by Darrell Korym, who won the 120 high hurdles (1:12), the 100 low hurdles (.21.1), the long jump (38-1/2) and the high jump (5-0).

North Farmington junior Dave Levy won the mile in 4:39.4. The performance pleased Raider coach Ron Holland.

"That was the first time he's run that well," Holland said. "We thought that was a real fine effort on his part. It was one of the outstanding times of the whole meet."

Waterford Mott beat Farmington Harrison, 84-37, in a Western Six League meet. Mott won 12 of the 15 events, but Harrison's Larry Colonna won the pole vault at 10-6.

Harrison, 1-4 overall, is having problems with injuries, according to coach Tom Shalla.

"We're totally injury prone," Shalla said. "Kip Wortman (long jumper) is sick. Greg White (high jumper) sprained his ankle. Dave Thorne (long jumper and quarter miler) goofed up his leg and can't run. Mark Potocki (half miler) has mono. Mike Redford (two miler) pulled a leg muscle and is done for a week."

Southfield Christian defeated Lathrup-Northern, 81-41, in a Class D meet last Thursday. Christian's Dan Hendon set a school record in the 400 (32.2), while teammate Ron Pew set another school mark in 228 (34.2).

Earlier, Ann Arbor St. Thomas beat Christian, 87-38. Christian is 3-5 this season.

Ferris slugger from NFHS

Dan Delling has played some outstanding baseball at Ferris State College since graduating from North Farmington High School three years ago.

Delling, Ferris' All-Great Lakes Conference first baseman, had quite a weekend at the plate recently. The 6-2, 170-pound senior hit two home runs and drove in seven runs as Ferris split a double header with Hope College on May 2.

Delling delivered a single in both games as the Bulldogs split a twin bill with Notre Dame a day later. He leads Ferris batters with a .449 average, three home runs and 18 runs batted in.

Ferris, the defending Great Lakes Conference champion, has compiled a 14-8 record so far this season.

Lot 627 of Grand River Crest No. 2 Subdivision, a subdivision of part of the SE 1/4 of Section 36, T19S, R18E, Farmington Township, Oakland County, Michigan, according to the Plat thereof as recorded in Liber 30, Page 2 of Plats, Oakland County records.

REGULATION AND TRUCKING

Some people feel the regulated transportation system of the United States should not be regulated. They argue, the industry which advocates of regulation, must be living their pockets because of it. And for these reasons, they argue the Interstate Commerce Commission should be abolished.

We have regulation for one prime reason: to insure transportation service and standardized rates for communities located away from major shipping centers such as Detroit. Here, there is no cutthroat competition or biased rates. A shipper in Adams can send his freight for the same rate as a shipper of similar freight in Detroit.

Shippers and merchants in places like Muskegon, Jackson, Port Huron and Midland can count on regular service and standard rates that do not change daily or hourly because of ICC regulation.

The way we see it, without regulation, Michigan communities would have little to depend upon, except extremely poor service and a very unfair rate system.

A regulated transportation system is not the best of all possible worlds. But it is far better than no transportation system at all. Or worse, a government-run system.
