Harrison lands last in Western Six meet

Farmington Harrison had little to cheer about at the Western Six League track meet last Wednesday at Livonia Churchill.

Harrison finished last in the six-team field, scoring nine points. Host Churchill won the meet with 81 1/2 points, 24 1/2 more than second-place Walled Lake Western. Northville High had 39 points. Waterford Mott 39 and Plymouth Canton 18.

Harrison's best showing came in the 440-yard relay. The Hawk team (Dave Thorne, Mike Bowden, Bob Miller and Greg White) won with a time of :43.3. That was an unlikely victory, according to Harrison coach Tom Shalla.

"We thought we'd do pretty well in the 100-yard dash with Ian Goldbaum, our best sprinter," Shalla said. "But Goldbaum pulled a hamstring in the preliminaries, and that scratched him from the 100, the 220 and the anchor of the 440 relay."

Harrison's Dave Thorne finished third in the long jump at 19.1. Harrison's heavyman's relay finished second, but that was a nonwinning event. Churchill won six scoring events.

Jim Reardon won the shot put with a league record 35-5 heave. Dave Gully, another Churchill star, set a league record in the half mile with a 7:17.1 clocking.

Waterford Mott's Dave Bair won the 220 dash in :22.9 to tie a league record. Walled Lake Western's Mike Wisniewski was the meet's only double winner, taking the long jump (30-34) and the 440 (1:55.5).

Kensington course open

Kensington Metropark's 18-hole golf course is open from 9 a.m. to dusk daily.

The opening hour is earlier on weekends and holidays. The hour will be expanded later in the season.

Fees for the par-71, 6,000-yard course are \$4.50 for 18 holes on weekdays and \$5.50 for weekends and holidays. For nine holes, the charge is \$3 on weekdays and \$3.50 on weekends and holidays.

Golfers must provide their own equipment, but power carts, hand carts and a limited number of accessories are available at the starter building.

The 1975 vehicle entry permits are required to enter the Harco-Clacon Metroparks from May through September. They are priced at \$5 for the annual permit, \$3 for senior citizens and \$1 daily.

Kensington Metropark is located at I-90 and Kent Lake Road south of Millford.

Couch Barry Basel credited gully performances by every member of his Rocket squad for bringing Westland John Glenn its second consecutive Northwest Suburban League track and field championship Wednesday at Livonia Franklin.

"Tom Jakubowski took three firsts and set a league record of 14.4 in the high hurdles to set the pace," Basel exclaimed after the meet. "But gully performances by our men in the field events gave us 23 points going into the track events."

"That set the tone for us. We felt if we could get 20 points in the field events we'd be in good shape. When we got 23, I knew we would be hard to beat."

Paced by the flying spines of superstar Jakubowski, Glenn rolled to five first place ribbons in running up its winning total of 64 points.

Host Bob Holmes of Franklin which took six firsts, brought his club in second with 53 points, followed by Thurston and North Farmington (tied) with 41, Oak Park (34) and Garden City East (19).

Individual brilliance abounded as Franklin's Dan Quisen captured both the 100 and 220 yard dashes and anchored the winning 400 relay squad. Teammate Greg McGuire also turned in a sparkling effort in breaking the tape in the 400 and running on the Patriots' victorious 800 yard and mile relay teams.

Thurston's Doug Korym placed in four events, second in the high jump, third in both the long jump and low hurdles and fifth in the high hurdles.

Holmes was very pleased with his team's effort as well as the entire meet. "It was a very exciting meet as the finishes show," he said, "and I'm satisfied with our finish. It was as well as we could hope for."

Big Mike Altmich started Glenn off on the right foot with a first in the high jump and teammate Dave Johnson took an unexpected third. Basel praised Johnson also for running the best 800 of his career in 1:39.1 to take second in that race.

North Farmington took two firsts in the field events. Tom Moore won the shot put at 40-10 and Dave Marchiori soared 13-4 to take pole vault honors.

Garden City East's standouts, Doug Sweeney and Art Kida, swept their races. Sweeney breaking the 800 yard tape in 1:37.8 and Kida taking the grueling two-mile with 9:30.8. Jakubowski, labeled by Basel as the

finest track man ever to run for Glenn in its 11-year history, also won the low hurdles and long jump and took fifth in the 220.

The other first place finishers were Glenn sophomore Ted Ubold, the first Rocket 100-grader ever to win a league title in track.

Franklin's strength was in the relays as it swept all three. In the 800, Greg McGuire, Jim Casey, Dave Smith and Phil Yuhass won in 1:32.

The 400 quartet of Dave Smith, Phil Yuhass, Jim Casey and Dan Quisen showed their heels to their opponents, winning in 44 seconds flat. In the mile relay, Clint Hall, Mike Rochowick, John Sames and Greg McGuire paced the pack with a time of 3:33.3.

Glenn won the Northwest League title outright by sweeping all five dual meets as well as the conference championship, totaling 12 points. Franklin's second in the league meet gave it nine points for second place in the final conference standings.

Undeclared Glenn has also won the Wayne Memorial Western Wayne Relays and the Dearborn Elks Club events this season.
