FARMINGTON—Ten-year-old Robert DeCicco of Farmington won first prize in the Farmington Beautification Commission's sketch contest for his drawings of a hardware store. Robert drew "before" and "after" sketches, first showing the Farmington store as it now appears and then sketching suggestions for beautification. The contest was sponsored by the commission for Farmington youth only. Entrants had to pick an area within the city, and draw suggestions to improve it. Robert won a \$25 savings bond. Doug Weilbaum won a translator radio as second prize for his drawing of a bowling alley. Translator radios also were awarded to third prize winner Doug Giesczynski and to Gail Hewker, who won fourth prize. Chip Hiltz won fifth place and a \$10 gift certificate for Richard's Cakes. The Rock Roadside took sixth and a \$10 gift certificate for Fashion Shoes. Most of the young entrants submitted suggestions for the city park. Mayor Ralph Yoder distributed the prizes Saturday with commissioner Bill Hartsock in attendance. Charlotte Bruce, chairman of the beautification commission, and JoAnne McShane, chairman of Keep Farmington Beautiful Month, also were there. Harry Wingerter, chairman of Michigan Week, attended. First prize was donated by James Wilby, president of Metropolitan National Bank. Second, third and fourth prizes were given by World Wide TV. The beautification commission may extend the contest to other age groups next year.

She studied during high school with musical soprano Mary Dalmege. She now studies with Paul Benningfield of Michigan State University. Mrs. Reynolds won first prize for vocal performance in the Musicale's Scholarship Competition when she was in the 11th grade. This year she sang the female lead "Gilda" in the M.S.U. production of "Rigoletto." She is also an accomplished solo pianist as well as an accompanist. Mrs. Reynolds' program will include three songs from Johannes Brahms' song cycle, "Zigeunerlieder." These are: "He Zigeuner greiss in die Salien ein," "Kommt dir nachmal in den Sinn," and "Rote Abenddämung." She will also sing two art songs by Claude Debussy, "Romance," and "Voice que le printemps." Her program will conclude with American works, "See How They Love Me" by Ned Rorem and "Ain't It a Pity" by Carlisle Floyd. She will be accompanied by her mother, Shirley Strey of the musicale.

MARCIA WALCK, pianist, will perform the second half of the program. Miss Walck is a graduate of Harrison High School where she won a music scholarship award. She is now a junior at Capital University in Columbus, Ohio where she carries a double major in piano performance and vocal music education. She studies piano with Verena Dambrowski and recently won the coveted Alcorn Piano Scholarship at Capital University. She has also received the Phi Beta Music Fraternity Golden Anniversary Award and the Keller Music Scholarship Award, given only to outstanding freshmen students at Capital. Marcia's program will consist of J.S. Bach's "Chromatic Fantasia," "Jeux D'eau" by Ravel, and Sonata in A Minor by Prokofiev.
