Fourth Quarterly Conference.

The 4th quarterly conference was
the best attended meeting of the
officials of the Methodist church
which has been held during the
past year.

The pastor's report showed that
eight members had been received
by letter, seven by confession of
faith and three restored, total gain
of eighteen; while we had lost one
by death, six by letter—leaving a
net gain of eleven in full member-
ship. There are also five names
on the roll of probationary mem-
bers, a gain of one.

The report also showed that
there had been collected for con-
ference claimants more during the
past year than in the preceding
three years, and more for bishops
than in the preceding two years.
The benevolences while not as
much as desired show a good in-
crease over those of last year.

The Sunday-school superintendent's
report showed a total enroll-
ment of over 200 and a large in-
crease in the attendance and col-
lection over that of any recent
year. About twice as much has
been spent for supplies and the
school has been able to meet all its
bills.

The president of the Epworth
League reported 35 members on
the roll with an average attend-
ance of about 30 during the year
at the Sunday evening meetings.
The chapter has paid \$15 for new
hymnals for the church, has all
bills paid and a little balance in
the treasury.

The president of the Ladies Aid
reported that there were 41 mem-
bers on the roll, that \$85.50 had
been paid to the pastor, beside the
\$10 given at Christmas time. That
\$10 had been paid for a parsonage
cook stove and \$2.00 for papering
at the parsonage, and about \$8 for
flowers for the sick and funerals.

Bids for the installation of an
adequate gas plant for lighting the
church were submitted by C. H.
Petibone and Wm. W. and the
matter was referred to a committee
consisting of Wm. Daines, Wm.
Smith and Mrs. Grace.

The following board of trustees
was elected for the ensuing con-
ference year: W. H. H. Smith,
W. T. Daines, A. L. Travis, D. L.
Dickerson, E. C. Grace, M. A.
Truscott, Jennie Grace.

The board of stewards named by
the pastor, and approved by the
conference will consist of W. H.
H. Smith, Harrison Weaver, M. A.
Truscott, Emma Travis, Charlotte
Wolfe, Minnie Bradley, Jennie
Harger.

The disciplinary committees were
appointed, the three most important
being those of the Sunday-school,
Mrs. Anna Cook, Mrs. Travis and
Mrs. Grace; temperance, Mes-
dames Truscott, Wolfe and Buno,
and church music, Mesdames
Stoney, Pierce and Lee.

The pastor was not invited to
return next year.

MACHINES MILK COWS

They Will Be Seen in Opera-
tion at the State Fair.

The farmer who laboriously milks
fifteen or twenty cows by hand
these days is doing unnecessary
work, is the belief of Ladd Bros.
of Saginaw, who have arranged for
a fine exhibit at the Michigan State
Fair. This firm is manufacturing
a novel machine that takes the
place of the farm hand in the milking
line. These machines will be
in operation every day at the fair.
Scores of animals will be milked
before large crowds and the quick-
ness of the operation will be a sur-
prise.

Besides being a great labor sav-
ing device, these milking machines
are guaranteed to be death-
proof as they can be kept scrupu-
lously clean and do not come in
touch with the human hands. A
large platform will be erected on
the fair grounds, and on this the
machines will be established. Then
several times during the day
cows will be driven there to be
milked.

The apparatus is operated by a
gasoline engine, which, when it is
not used for this purpose, can be
employed for other work, such as
running the corn cutter and the
washing machine. Skilled opera-
tors will be present and show how
everything is done. This will be
one of the most interesting features
of the fair and should not be mis-
sed by anyone who attends.

Farwell, "Coffin Nails."

Few people realize that after
September 17, when the laws pas-
sed at the last session of the legis-
lature go into effect, any person un-
der the age of 21 who is found
smoking cigarettes in any public
place will be liable to arrest and
may be punished by a fine of not to
exceed \$10 or imprisonment not to
exceed five days for each offense,
except that under a provision of the
law as passed, any such minor who
gives evidence which will lead to
the arrest of the person selling such
cigarettes may have sentence sus-
pended.

Any person who is guilty of sell-
ing cigarettes in any form to a
minor is liable to arrest under the
law, and may be punished by a
fine of not to exceed \$50 or im-
prisonment in the county jail not
to exceed 30 days for each offense.

The provisions of the law are
such that it would seem that the
"coffin nail" is doomed so far as
minors are concerned.
