CHILDREN AT THE FAIR

THURSDAY, SEPT. 7, HAS BEEN SET APART AS DAY FOR THE LITTLE FOLKS.

Program of Games and Other Features Have Been Arranged—Liberal Prizes Will Be Awarded to the Successful Contestants—Admission Free to Those Under 12.

Tuesday, Sept. 7, has been set apart by the Michigan State Fair this year as children's day. It is estimated that at least 35,000 youngsters will avail themselves of the invitation to attend the fair on this date. Every child in Michigan under the age of 12 years who comes to the gate on Sept. 7 will be admitted free, no ticket being required. A program prepared especially for the little folks will be announced later, which provides for one continuous round of pleasure from morning until night. Besides the attractions prepared especially for the little folks there will continue the regular fair features that will fill every hour of the day.

Children's day last year was one of the greatest events of the fair. Thousands of parents from every part of the state attended and brought with them the children.

Special attention will be given to lost youngsters. A department of the fair will receive every child and care for it until it is safely returned to the parents. Ample police protection will constantly be maintained and parents need have no fear of harm coming to their little ones.

Officials of the Michigan State Fair announce that the grounds will be turned over to the children on Sept. 7, and that there will be no "keep off the grass" signs to hamper the pleasure of the event.

MOTOR CYCLISTS TO RACE.

Michigan State Fair Offers Big Prizes for Those Engaging in Exciting Contest.

One of the interesting attractions at the Michigan State Fair this year will be the motor cycle races, which are scheduled for Sept. 3. President Hunter, of the Detroit Motor Cycle Club, and other officials of that organization, have mapped out a list of events that is attracting riders from all over the country. The State Fair has appropriated \$10,000 in prizes which will be turned over to the motor cycle club to be used for the purchase of prizes. Added to these are the manufacturers from scores of cities are donating valuable articles.

President Hunter says it is planned to award a prize to every rider who crosses the line, and the event is a high place among the motor cyclists because they know they will get something even though they finish last.

While these races are in progress Kopp's celebrated band from Cincinnati will furnish music for the entire day. The band has a reputation all over the country for its music.

Over in the grounds other attractions will be continuing. The fair will be something to interest everyone and so one who visits the fair this year will experience a dull moment.

The Hayrack clowns will be a funny feature. They will visit every part of the fair and even venture down into the city where they will make fun at various times during the day. While being very funny they will also do some thrilling tumbling on a hay wagon.



POLICE AND FIREMEN AT FAIR.

Every Precaution Will Be Taken at Michigan's Annual Exhibition to Protect Lives and Property of Everyone Who Visits the Grounds.

The management of the Michigan State Fair, which opens this year on September 2 at Detroit, and continues until September 10, has planned to give the exhibition city every facility for safety. This applies both to police and fire protection. This is as it should be, as thousands and thousands of dollars worth of property are taken to the grounds during the week of the fair. The Detroit police and the sheriff and his deputies have planned this year, as heretofore, to make the exhibition as safe from disorder, chaos, fire and thug as is done down in Detroit. Gambling will not be permitted and everything that tends to lower the high standard of the fair will be eliminated.

The protection against fire is as complete as any section of Detroit. An engine house with a full equipment of metropolitan fire fighters from the Detroit department will remain constantly on duty during the exhibition. With such facilities as these, it is almost impossible for a fire disaster to occur. The Michigan State Fair is practically an organized city and every comfort will be given visitors that can be secured down in Detroit.
