

Schools hold summer registration

Registration is now taking place for summer classes sponsored by Farmington School District.

Among the programs offered at the elementary level are individualized learning center instruction, gymnastics, basketball, wrestling, instrumental music and string music.

Elementary registrations are being held at Kenbrook School, 3280 Kenbrook, Thursday, June 19, and Friday, June 20, from 8 a.m. to noon and 1-5 p.m.

The learning center classes aid second through sixth graders in reading, spelling and language skills as well as creative writing, math, science and social science. Classes meet mornings June 24-August 3. The fee is \$18 per class hour.

Classes in beginning, intermediate and advanced tumbling, trampolines and apparatus will be given at North Farmington High School, 3280 Thirteenth Mile, 8 a.m.-noon beginning Monday, June 23. The fee is \$18 and students may register the first day of class at the high school gym.

A special two-week beginner class in gymnastics will be held for kindergarten through third grade youngsters at North Farmington gym at 8 a.m. each day. Registration will be at the first class meeting, Monday, June 23 or the second session opening, Monday, July 14.

The fee for the regular gymnastics course is \$18 and \$10 for the beginner session.

A six-week basketball program will be held in Farmington High School gym June 23-Aug. 1. Fourth and fifth graders will meet from 8-9:30 a.m. and sixth and seventh graders will

play from 12:30-2 p.m. The fee is \$18. Registration is at the first class meeting.

A wrestling clinic open to all sixth grade students will be held at Farmington High School. Students should pre-register at the Administration Building, 3280 Shawnee. The fee is \$18.

Instrumental music classes will be held at both Ten Mile and Kenbrook schools. The Ten Mile school classes are from 8:30-11 a.m. and enroll 18-20 students. Students may register the first day, Monday, June 23. The fee is \$18.

Intermediate and advanced string instruction will be provided at Ten Mile school from 8-10:30 a.m. and Kenbrook, 10:30-noon. Classes meet Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from June 24-Aug. 3. Registration is the first day of class. The fee is \$11.

Secondary school classes will be held in Harrison High School, 2005 Twelve Mile. They begin Tuesday, June 24 and end Aug. 5. Tuition is \$35 for two-hour classes and \$70 for the four-hour ones. Fees are due at the time of registration, Thursday, June 19 and Friday, June 20.

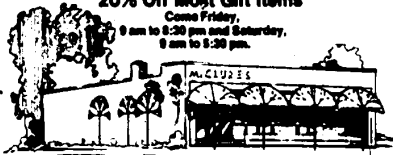

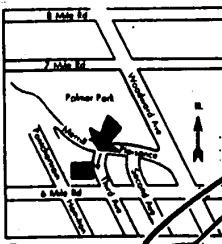
