

# BRIDGE

Hands that give both sides a chance at game always create discussion about what might have happened. This hand in the diagram gives both sides a chance at slam — or even a grand slam — and one side a second chance.

West led the queen of diamonds. What might have been is easily seen by examining the deal. North-South can reach six diamonds and their opponents have no defense. The defense has one club winner and it must be won on the opening lead or it will disappear.

Of course East-West will bid six hearts. Similarly, it cannot be defeated and the defense has one spade trick if the opening lead is a top spade.

North-South's final chance is six spades, but here the chance is not so good. If West can give East a diamond ruff, winning the setting trick in clubs is a simple matter.

In practice, six diamonds is an unlikely contract. Hearts will be bid and six hearts doubled or six spades is more likely.

If East doubles, West knows an unusual lead is needed, but it is probably not clear if the double calls for a diamond or a club. Thus the slam, even the grand slam has a 50 percent chance.
