### New TROLLEY LINE

#### Farmington to Be Connected With Lansing by Road.

Articles of incorporation of the  
Detroit, Lansing & Grand Rapids  
Electric line have been filed at  
Lansing and a mortgage for  
\$5,000,000 to secure a bond issue  
of equal amount was filed Fri-  
day at the office of the Wayne  
county register of deeds. The  
Union Trust company is trustee  
under the mortgage.

Officers of the new road, as given  
in the articles are: President, Dr.  
Oliver H. Lau; vice president,  
Henry M. Wallace; secretary-  
treasurer, George Valentine.

Plans of those interested con-  
template the beginning of active  
construction work in the spring.  
It is the intention to build the line  
from Farmington to Lansing first.

"Our line will connect the two  
largest cities of the state, passing  
through the capital of the state on  
the way," said Vice President  
Wallace. "It will go through a  
prosperous farming section, as well

as numerous cities and villages.  
We anticipate no difficulty in  
winning the proposition.

The bond issue of the new road  
\$5,000,000 at 5 percent interest  
to be dated July 1, 1909.

### Potato Growers' Meeting.

Potato growers of Michigan will  
meet at Traverse City Sept. 10 to  
discuss the question of a campaign  
for profitable prices. The indica-  
tions are that Michigan will pro-  
duce the largest crop of potatoes in  
its history.

Reports from other  
heavy producing sections and  
states indicate a heavy yield and  
the United States will probably  
produce a record-breaking crop.

All potato growers are invited to  
attend this meeting and assist in  
forming an organization whereby  
fair and equitable prices can be  
secured.

Governor Warner has been in-  
vited and he is expected to attend  
the meeting.

### Must Not Run Backwards.

The Michigan railroad commis-  
sion has just issued an order  
prohibiting state railroads from run-  
ning any trains backward, or with  
cars ahead of the engine. Ninety  
days are given the railroads in  
which to put in V's and turntables,  
and it is probable that the order  
will cause a big protest from the  
railroad companies because of the  
expense of getting the roads in  
condition to comply with this order.

The chief reason for this order  
is that the engineer does not have  
a clear view of the track over the  
pile of coal on the tender.

An order has also been issued by  
the commission regulating the  
speed limit over interlocking plants  
the maximum for passenger and  
freight trains to be 30 miles per  
hour. If the interlockers are not  
in the very best condition the  
speed must be less.

### Better Service.

The service to the state fair on  
the various Detroit United Lines  
last year was right up to the notch  
but the plans for this year call for  
even a better service and patrons of

The one feature of the service  
this year more noticeable than ever  
will be the care of the crowds after  
the fireworks. The 11 p. m. cars on  
the various lines will run  
through and there will be enough  
sections to each to care for all those  
who witness the immense pyro-  
technic displays.

Internal passengers, on asking  
for transfers when entering the city  
will without additional cost be car-  
ried to the state fair grounds, al-  
though on this hand the D. U. R. is  
entitled to collect additional fare.

### Loan Has Been Made.

State Treasurer Sleeper, acting  
for the state board of auditors, has  
made arrangements for the state to  
borrow \$250,000, which the new  
constitution gives the state the  
right to do. The money has been  
secured from Detroit banks.

The banks have been very gen-  
erous in this matter and will loan  
the state this sum at the low rate  
of three per cent. The money will  
be secured in \$25,000 and \$50,000  
sums, as it is needed to pay state  
employees and to meet the current  
expenses of the state.
