Suggestions to ease teens growing pains

If you have an adolescent in your home, you know that the teen years are filled with both pleasure and problems. Your child is finally becoming an adult, someone you can relate to as a friend. But in the process he or she may suffer physical and mental changes which cause stress and strain on the whole family.

To help you ease your teenager's growing pains, the Department of Health, Education and Welfare has written a booklet entitled "An Adolescent in Your Home." The booklet is available for 30 cents from Consumer Information, Dept. 36, Pueblo, Colorado 81009.

The booklet suggests that the best way to help your teenager is to provide him with all the facts about growing up. Lend a sympathetic adult ear to his problems and be ready to discuss any information you give him.

For instance, most teenagers are liable to draw their own conclusions

about sex. However, you can influence your child's decision by providing him with all the facts about the physical and emotional aspects of sexual relationships.

You can also help your teenager find out about various job opportunities. However, don't try to force him in any one direction. It's natural for you to want "something better" for your child, but you may aid him most by helping him realize that any job can be done with dignity.

Most of all, be a friend to your child. This may be the most difficult time of his life. He needs your support even though he may often seem to reject your help.

If you're having a serious problem with your child, such as drug or alcohol abuse, stealing or running away, seek professional help from your local family counseling service or a doctor. But do get help — don't ignore the problem and hope that it will go away.
