

# Getting Around

The atmosphere is cozy English pub, but the food specialty is Greek at the Squire's Pub, 178 W. Maple Road near Crooks, Troy.

Owner Phillip Terry and his wife Vicki, who are Americans of Greek heritage, realized a dream when they added the Squire's Pub dining room onto their Terry's Country Squire coffee and sandwich shop a year and a half ago.

Vicki, who helps greet customers in the evenings, is an antique buff, and she selected the stained glass windows and old English prints that adorn the purposely windowless (to control lighting) restaurant.

Host Phillip is on the premises much of the time, overseeing the entire operation including dishes prepared by Greek-born chef George Margitis who is now an American citizen. Margitis has more than 20 years background in cooking Greek cuisine.

THE LUNCHEON menu always includes a special of the day, for example, stuffed cabbage Greek style with egg lemon sauce, mashed potatoes, soup or salad, and roll and butter for \$2.55, or baked lamb ribs Greek style, rice pilaf, soup or salad, roll and butter for \$2.95.

Other Greek specials on the menu range from Avgolemono (egg lemon soup) to Karadopeta (walnut cake), and there are tasty appetizers, salads and entrees, everything in a cart.

Terry recommends for an "adventure in food" the soup and salad that combines authentic Greek feta cheese, olives and olive oil plus chick peas that are not Greek but "every-one requests them."

Or, he suggests two persons order Peta (spinach pie) of spinach, feta cheese and cottage cheese, or Dolmas, rolled grape leaves stuffed with meat and rice with egg lemon

sauce, to share as an appetizer, followed by Greek salad.

Terry says the spinach pie and Dolmas are prepared according to old family recipes handed down from his mother's mother. His mother, who died at 94, was from Constantinople, now Istanbul.

Other Greek specials on the menu include Pastichio and

Mousaka, which he describes as similar to Greek salad and the same cream sauce, but the Mousaka contains eggplant fried in olive oil and then baked.

All the Greek menu items are popular, he said, including Souvlaki, meat kabobs marinated a couple of days ahead and then broiled. Originally

there were only three or four Greek items on the menu, but the restaurant keeps adding more due to public demand.

At lunch or dinner, good old American hamburgers are available, too. The Pub Burger is a double patty bun with cheddar cheese and onion within the patties.

Authentic Greek wines are served by the glass or bottle. See Helena, a dry white wine, is recommended by Terry for those who are not familiar with Greek wines. The well-known Retina, which may be ordered, is described as having more bite.

The dumpy lit restaurant is open from 11:30 a.m. to 11 p.m. weekdays and from 5 p.m. to 1 a.m. Saturdays.

## Greek food at Squire's Pub

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
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A portion of the Old West will be revived beginning this Saturday and running every Saturday through Aug. 18 at the Troy Hilton Inn.
