Bikers' marathon a hit

Boston may be famous for its marathon 26-mile race, but evidence coming in since last Sunday could prove that Birmingham is destined to become famous for an equally sophisticated sport.

The Great Birmingham Bicycle Ride II, a half-day event that attracted American Bicycle League riders from as far away as Vero Beach, Fla., has been termed "very successful" even before its sponsors—Cottonwood Ground and the Birmingham Junior Women's Club—have had a chance to total all of the receipts.

"I think we've got to say we're very well pleased with the way things went from any perspective you look at," Ted Rice, Cottonwood Ground coordinator, said Tuesday.

"We had a total of 70 more riders than we did in 1974, we had a higher quality field that made the races more competitive, and the crowds

seemed more enthusiastic and knowledgeable this time around."

One of the highlights of the day came in the intermediate boys' race division won by Chris Carmichael of Miami, Fla.

Entering the final stretch of that race, two Birmingham boys collided and put their bikes out of commission. Fighting for additional points awarded to the top four finishers in the race, Greg Bell and Fred Schuler ripped their bikes from the pavement and sprinted more than two blocks to the finish.

Bell won the head-to-head match, finishing third. Schuler finished fourth.


Michigan cyclists placed first in four of the seven events, led by Sheila Young's finish in the women's division. In that race Ms. Young used a break-away sprint to beat her nemesis, Kathy Opolski of the South Chicago Wheelmen.

Daniel Manur of Ann Arbor won the Senior III and IV division, and veteran rider J. Brian Chappel of Battle Creek won his division.

The final Michigan win came in the intermediate girls' division, where Heather Lund of Dearborn finished ahead of Karen Schaug of St. Clair Shores and Connie Paraskiv of Detroit.

Although several riders suffered the normal abrasions incurred in cycling, only one, Pete Girard of Dearborn, needed to be hospitalized.

He suffered a broken shoulder in a spectacular collision only 300 yards from the finish line of the seniors' division race.
