

False lashes: part of makeup

Brown is best for light blondes, and dark brown for everyone else. Remember, your eye makeup must be complimentary to your lash color.

Graceful, sweeping eyelashes can do exciting things for every woman's eye. Sometimes they can be tricky and it takes practice to learn to put them on correctly. So, if they don't come out just right the first time, don't give up — you just need practice.

IF YOU'VE selected the right lash, too much cutting shouldn't be needed. But, don't be afraid to snip off some width if necessary. When cutting, be sure to snip off at outer

edge where lashes are the longest. All of your eye makeup (except eye-liner) must be applied before you put on your eyelashes. This means you curl and mascara your own lashes first. In application, the first step is applying the glue. Never apply the glue directly onto your eyelid. Very little glue is required and this should be applied in a thin line along the base of the eyelash. (Use a hairpin or a toothpick).

Hold the lash with your fingers or tweezers, by the hairs, being careful not to touch the base strip when you're applying the glue. Now — here's the trick. Don't apply the eyelash right away. Wait until the glue is tacky (30 to 60 sec-

onds). The newer the glue, the longer it takes. While you're waiting, bend the lash into a half moon to contour the lash strip to the shape of your own eye.

Once the glue is tacky, the lash is applied when your eye is half open. If you apply the lash to a closed eye, you will have an improper fit and the lash will lift off when you open your eye.

WHEN APPLYING the lash, be sure the shorter hairs are toward the inner corner of your eye. Now, center the lash close to the base of your own lashes and press ends into place with rounded end of hairpin or with blunt end of eyeliner brush.

Gently press down the lash strip from center to ends in both directions (outward and inward) firmly. Open eye to check on how well lash strip is blended with your own lashes. If more blending is necessary, quickly close eye and firmly

press lash strip down further into your own lashes.

The last step is the application of your eyeliner which must match your lashes.

If you've done a good job, your lashes will stay on until you're ready to take them off, so it looks great and no one should be able to tell if you're wearing them.

IN ANSWER to your question:

Never apply mascara to your false eyelashes, you'll destroy them.

When you've removed your lashes, with your fingernail, pick off the glue right away. If you do, the glue should come off easily in one step. If you wait, the glue will be much more difficult to remove, and, in trying to remove it, you can damage the tiny strip that holds your lashes together.

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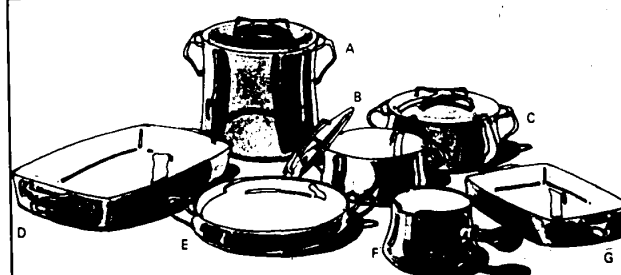
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
