

JCC elects new president

Hugh W. Greenberg, long active in community and Center affairs, was elected President of the Jewish Community Center of Metropolitan Detroit at the recent meeting of the Center board of directors. Past President, Richard Kus, was named chairman of the executive committee.

The board also elected Thomas I. Klein, of Birmingham; Joel D. Tau-

ber, of Huntington Woods; Julian S. Tobias, of Southfield; and Mrs. Sidney J. Winer, of Detroit, to positions as vice president.

George Friedman, of Birmingham, was named to the post of Secretary; and Hershel Stuart, of Huntington Woods, was elected treasurer.

Mrs. Samuel Babcock, of Huntington Woods; Harold Gales, of Detroit; and Lawrence Jackler, of Birmingham, were elected members-at-large.

Greenberg has a long and distinguished history of participation in greater Detroit Jewish communal affairs. He has been a board member of the Jewish Community Center since 1964, and has served as board vice president for the past several years. He has also been active in the Jewish community's annual Allied Jewish Campaign.

A Southfield resident, Greenberg is a member of the American Jewish Committee, ORT (Organization for Rehabilitation through Training), Temple Beth-El, and the Technion of Israel. His wife, Carolyn, is a Vice President of the Jewish Family and Children's Service, and they have three children: Amy, Dan, and Ned.

The Annual Meeting also witnessed the special awarding of certificates of

Mental health board reappointed

The Oakland County Board of Commissioners has acted to reconstitute the County Community Mental Health Services Board, and to appoint its members to new terms of office.

Reappointment was required by the provisions of Michigan's new Mental

Health Code. The Code repeals legislation dating from 1963 which created community mental health boards around the state. According to the Code, these boards must be recreated by vote of the county boards of commissioners, if county community mental health programs such as Oakland's are to continue after Aug. 6.

The Board has reappointed the twelve existing Mental Health Board members to staggered terms. Paul Neal Averill, Robert M. Bookmyer, M.D., Fred D. Houghton, and Victoria S. Levin are appointed to terms ending Dec. 31, 1975. Julian A. Cook, Jr., Betty J. Hitchcock, Anne M. Hobart, and Barbara J. Reader are appointed to terms ending Dec. 31, 1976. Alex Capsalis, Lew L. Coy, Ralph T. Norvell, and Frederick J. Poole are appointed to terms ending Dec. 31, 1977.

Subsequent appointments to the Mental Health Board will be for three-year terms, as specified in the Mental Health Code.

The Oakland County Community Mental Health Services Board is an arm of County government, funded by the State and County. The Board currently operates or contracts for some \$4 million of services for the mentally ill and retarded, of all ages—outpatient therapy, partial hospitalization, day treatment and day training programs, and other specialized services. All programs charge fees based on the client's ability to pay.

Earnings can change SS pay

Working people under age 72 getting social security retirement, survivors, or dependents payments should report any changes in their 1975 earnings estimates as soon as possible, according to Stefan Gasparovic, manager of the Detroit-Northwest Social Security Office at 17500 Lahser.

Social security payments to people 72 and over aren't affected by their earnings. "But earnings can affect payments to people under 72," Gasparovic said. "They should report any change in their work or earnings on the post card sent to people who work and get social security checks. If the post card is lost, the report can be made by calling or visiting any social security office."

"People who find they are earning less than they originally estimated may get additional social security payments during 1975 if they report the change."

"But people earning more than they originally estimated who don't report the change may get social security payments not due them and have to pay back some money at the end of the year."

Social security payments are not affected by earnings of \$2,520 or less for the year. Payments are reduced \$1 for each \$2 earned over \$2,520, but no matter how much people earn in a year, they can get their full social security payment for any month they neither earn over \$210 nor do substantial work in their own business.
