I do know the difference between a playground and a park. The school board has a great deal of acreage around school sites I was talking of much more than playgrounds with swings and slides." he said.

Opperthauser warned his council col-leagues they must be wary of talking of a plan without fulfilling the plans. He said funding was a major concern

"We've got to look at the priorities of city funding. We've got to make sure that no stone is left unturned for county development of parks," he

He urged the council consider parks to which children can walk. One large park could be difficult to get to by foot or bike for those residents in the south end if the park was located in the horth section of the Hills. Farmington Hills south end is nearly fully developed with housing developments and leaves little room for a large park.
