Facts from FAAC

Q. What kind of crime is shoplifting?

A. Shoplifting (stealing in a store) is a felony under Michigan law. A felony is a serious crime punishable by a term in prison. The value of the stolen merchandise makes no difference, but authorities can reduce the charge to simple larceny (which is a misdemeanor) if the value is under \$100. If you're convicted, the penalty is up to 90 days in the county jail or a fine of up to \$100. If the offender is under 17 years of age, the case would fall under the jurisdiction of juvenile court.

Q. What is juvenile court?

A. The juvenile court is a division of the Probate Court in your county. It is a special court for young people who get into trouble with the law or need help because of family problems.

Q. If I am accused of a crime, will I have a criminal trial in juvenile court?

A. If you are under 17 and are accused of such acts as would be criminal if committed by an adult, you are brought before juvenile court as a delinquent person. A trial may then be set where the same rules of law as those applying to adults are used. This hearing, however, is not a criminal trial. It is being held in a special court devoted specifically to people under 17 years of age. In this hearing, you have these rights: (1) your own or a court-appointed attorney; (2) privilege against self-incrimination; you don't have to testify against yourself; (3) a choice of jury trial or trial by the court (judge). The purpose of juvenile court is to try to help young people by giving them guidance, care and control.

Adult classes are offered

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An intermediate stitch-the-knits class, running eight weeks, also uses Bishop techniques. A knowledge of sewing is required. Projects are a washable lined knit cap or jacket, dress and trimming materials for knit garments.

This class will meet on Monday from 7:10 p.m. in room 105A. Fee is \$15.

The seamstress with basic sewing ability may acquire techniques in suit making in a class called Men's Wear II (sportcoat), also an eight week course.

Students will be taught how to make a professional looking knit sportcoat. The class will meet Tuesday from 7:10 p.m. in room 105A. Cost is \$15.

A class in intermediate sewing for the student with previous formal instruction will meet Thursday from 7:10 p.m. in Farmington Junior High, Room 104. Fee is \$15.

Emphasis will be on individual problems and advanced techniques.

A six-week class in crochet will teach the basic stitches. The class will meet Monday from 7:30-9:30 p.m. in room 100C of the high school. Fee is \$10.

Knitting I, an eight week course, will teach the basic stitches and pattern reading. No experience is necessary. Bring a pair of size 8 needles and one skein of four-ply white yarn.

The knitting class will meet Tuesday from 7:30-9:30 p.m. in room 100C. Cost is \$12.

A five-week class in needlepoint will teach 16 different stitches using sampler technique. Students also will be taught how to apply a design to their own pattern. A \$10 kit will be necessary.

The class will meet Wednesday from 7:30-9:30 p.m. in room 100E. Fee is \$10.

A class in pulled work on canvas will meet for five weeks. The student will be taught use of a variety of cotton threads and many pulled work stitches. The technique of pulled work on needlepoint canvas also will be taught and the lacy appearance of the stitches will create a sampler.

KNOWLEDGE OF basic needlepoint is necessary and a 21 inch rotating frame is advisable. A kit can be purchased for \$10.

The class will meet Tuesday from 7:30-9:30 p.m. in room 100E and will cost \$10.

A class in Early American crewel embroidery will celebrate the bicentennial. Students may embroider an "early American heirloom." A sampler of authentic 18th century designs and stitches will be done in class.

Materials fee will be \$10.50 and class fee \$10. The group will meet Thursday from 7:30-9:30 p.m. in room 112E.

Also offered will be a special bi-centennial class called "Spirit of '76" Crewel Embroidery. Students will be taught how to embroider a "Spirit of '76" eagle motif on a skirt, other clothing, fabrics for clothing or a handbag. Materials will cost \$4.50 and class fee is \$10. The class will meet Thursday from 8:30-10:30 p.m. in room 112E.

A six-week class in weaving will teach weaving techniques and produce pile woven objects and decorative bands. The woven objects may be used individually or assembled for creative possibilities. No previous experience is necessary.

There will be a small materials charge and a \$5 loom deposit on the first night. Class fee is \$16. The class will meet Thursday from 7:30-9:30 p.m. in room 101A.

A four-week, mini-class in weaving will begin Nov. 6 and end Dec. 4. The class will be in creative frame loom weaving and will provide an opportunity to learn creative and contemporary tapestry weaving.

Students may create their own design for wall, hanging or cushion. A \$4 loom deposit will be collected the first night. Fee is \$5. The class will meet Thursday from 7:30-9:30 p.m. in room 101A.

A class in gourmet cooking will offer advanced food preparation for entertaining. Included will be hors d'oeuvres, cooking with wines, souffles, crepes, meat and seafood dishes as well as unusual desserts.

Fee is \$20 and materials are extra. The class may be attended Tuesday or Thursday from 7:30-9:30 p.m. in room 102A.

A cake decorating class will provide a professional touch for both beginners and those with experience. Creation of flowers, children's and seasonal cakes, and icing techniques are included.

Fee is \$15 and materials are extra. The class will meet Tuesday from 7:10 p.m. in room 104E.

A class in home entertainment, formally titled "hospitality," will include a variety of ideas on foods. The eight-week course will teach vegetable carving, flower arranging, party favors, fancy tea, sandwiches and hors d'oeuvres as well as gift wrapping bows.

THERE WILL BE a low material fee and a \$12 class charge. The class

will meet on Monday from 7:30-9:30 p.m. in room 104E.

A class in furniture refinishing is designed to help the student identify various woods and prepare wood surfaces for a finish.

Materials will include stains, paste fillers, varnish, shellac, paints and lacquer type finishes. Refinishing will be the main function of the course, allowing the student to bring in some piece of furniture to refurbish. Fee is \$15 and the class will meet Tuesday from 7:10 p.m. in room 105G.

A class in interior design is intended for students who want to learn the basic principles of decorating. The course includes sessions on floor plans, kitchen and bathroom design, color schemes, wall and window treatments, floor coverings, furniture styles, furniture arrangements and lighting.

The class will meet Thursday from 7:10 p.m. in room 105E. Fee is \$12.

A class in upholstery will offer both group demonstration and individual instruction. Tools and a large selection of materials may be purchased. Students are advised to bring a chair the first night of class.

Students have a choice of Monday or Wednesday from 7:10 p.m. The class will meet in the basement. Fee is \$20.

Six art classes will be offered. A class in Japanese style brush painting will deal with the "zen" style of mood painting. Using this oriental technique, the student may capture the essence of a subject with a few brush strokes. Previous art experience is not required.

Fee is \$25 and materials are extra. The class will meet Wednesday from 7:30-9:30 p.m. in room 111A.

A macramé class will teach the use of basic knots and their variations, enabling creation of numerous decorative items.

The class will meet Thursday from 7:30-9:30 p.m. in room 105E. Fee is \$12.

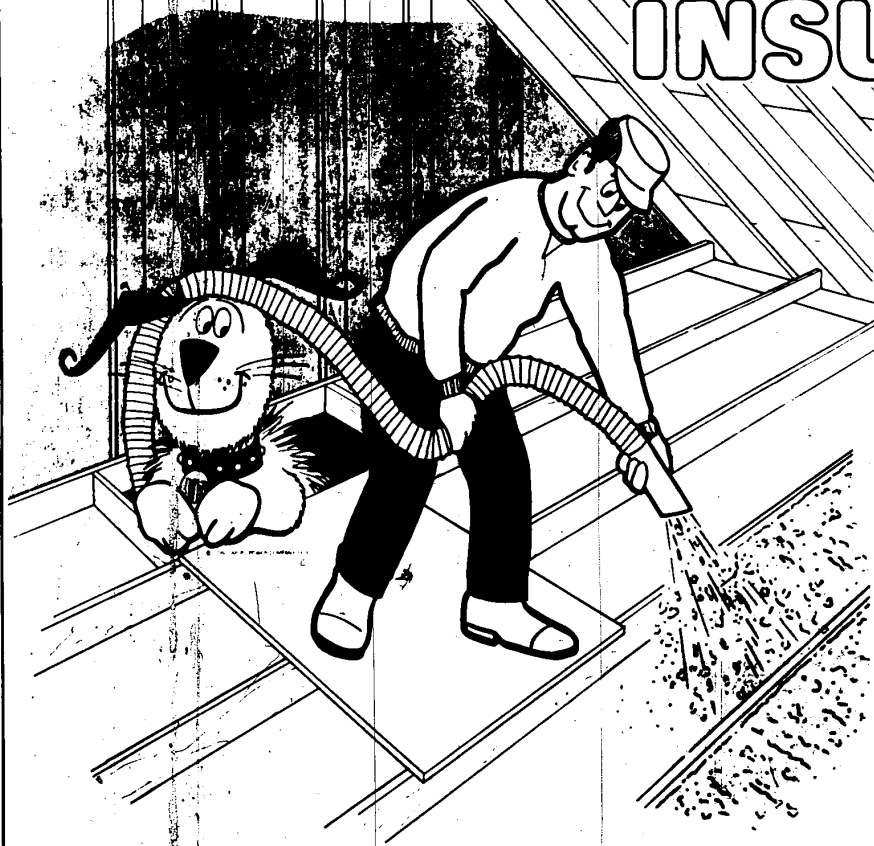
A class in adult ceramics will be a freely structured course in basic techniques, including both hand-built and wheel-thrown methods. Emphasis will be on exploring clay and creative handling of the medium.

Decorating and glazing techniques also will be taught. Students should bring plastic bags and canvas or oil cloth to the first class. The class will meet Tuesday at Harrison High School from 7:10 p.m. in room 302. A \$21 fee includes a materials charge.
