2 days of events mark International Women's Year

Its scope will include a variety of workshops developed by members of the advisory committee on subjects of interest to women, entertainment by women, exhibits of women's projects and movies of special interest to women.

Just one event will push a male viewpoint, and in that panel discussion, Dr. Ned Papania, Detroit psychologist, and his panel of young men will be talking about women.

The topic for their discussion, scheduled at 3 p.m. Thursday on the center's upper level, is "Does Ms. Mean Misery?"

"We expect this event to be of particular interest to Schoolcraft's younger students," said Mrs. Christensen, "because the participants will be airing some of their reactions to the changing roles of women."

PATRICIA BURNETT, the featured speaker, will offer her slide presentation Wednesday at 8 p.m. on the upper level.

Ms. Burnett, a Detroit resident, is a national board member of the National

Organization for Women (NOW), a member of the Michigan Women's Commission, and a well-known portrait painter.

She has traveled extensively in Europe and the Far East to help organize a World Feminist Conference projected for 1977, and she was one of Michigan's representatives to the International Women's Year gathering in Mexico City.

In her presentation, she is expected to outline what the growing international women's movement has meant to women in various parts of the world.

WORKSHOPS, planned and led by members of the SC Women's Advisory Committee, will deal with a wide variety of subjects.

"Women and the law," coordinated by County Commissioner Mary Dumas and scheduled from 10 a.m. to 12 noon Thursday, will involve Wayne County Probate Judge Gladys Barsamian, Olga Madar of the Coalition of Labor Union Women, Jan Bendor of the Wayne County prosecutor's office and Beverly Taylor, detective on the Wayne County sheriff patrol.

Exploring "The Role of Women in Politics" will be a panel including Delora Yori, a member of the Garden City school board, Laura Toy, political science student, and a representative of the League of Women Voters. Laura Callow is coordinator and the time is 2 p.m. Wednesday.

Donna Johnson will talk on how tax law changes affect women in a "Women and Taxes" workshop headed by Jean Budd at 10 a.m. Wednesday, and Denise Radtke and Charlotte Adams will head a panel considering

"Non-Traditional Careers," for two hours beginning at 12 p.m. Wednesday. Other workshop topics include: "It was a 30-year-old Freshman," headed by Lois Wade, "Homemaking, a Valuable Career," with Peggy Meyer, "Women and Finance," with Dorothy Knecht, "Spirit and Mind," with Sister Margaret Basso.

Gale Buchanan, Schoolcraft's audiovisual librarian, will conduct a multimedia presentation featuring some of her own art and literary work.
