Following a film called "Arthritis" Dr. James J. Lightbody, medical director of the Michigan Chapter Arthritis Foundation, will

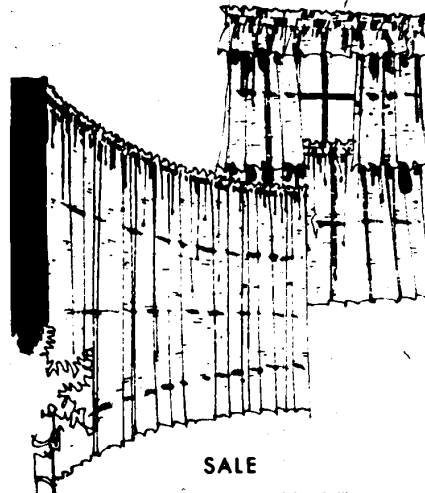
speak and answer questions.

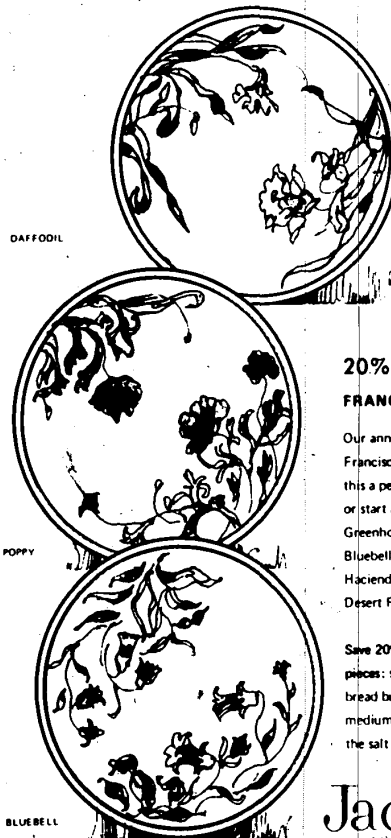
