

# Art, drama, literature events set pace for fall in library

Storyhours, creative dramatics, an art class and Junior Great Books discussion groups are all in the offing for youngsters in the Farmington Hills Community Library on Twelve Mile Road this fall.

Storyhours for the 3-5 year old set are held each weekday starting Sept. 15-19, designed for the child who can sit attentively (with some activity breaks) for a 30 minute period without parental attendance.

**THE ACTIVITIES** vary, using stories, songs, puppetry, finger plays, and dramatics. Enrollment is limited, though Farmington and Farmington Hills patrons get first preference for the day of the week as well as morning or afternoon sessions.

Creative Dramatics is a six week series to be held on Wednesdays from 10:30-11 a.m. beginning Sept. 17 for the 4 and 5 year old not yet in kindergarten. The program stresses use of the imagination

with no memorization of lines or practice before a mirror.

An art class for the 4 and 5 year old teaches the use of paints, scissors, ink, paste, and clay to develop both concepts of art in the traditional form as well as individual expression. All sessions will revolve around a book or story familiar to the participants.

Lessons are one hour long from 1-2 p.m. every Monday and Wednesday beginning Oct. 6 and 8. A small fee asked for this class covers the cost of materials used.

**BOTH LIBRARIES** offer Junior Great Books discussion groups which will run from October through April. The club, stemming

from the University of Chicago, utilizes literature as a means of guiding group discussions concerning basic concepts and ideas in life. Participants learn to communicate their ideas and understand the opinions of others.

The course is offered to children in the fifth and sixth grades only. The Farmington Branch group will meet the first and third Mondays of each month beginning Oct. 6 and 20 from 4:14-5:15 p.m. The Farmington Hills Branch group will meet the first and third Thursdays of the month from 7-8 p.m. beginning Oct. 9 and 23. A materials charge will be asked at the time of registration.

**CITY OF FARMINGTON  
COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS**  
(Summary)

A Regular Meeting of the Farmington City Council was called to order at 8:00 P.M. Tuesday, September 2, 1975, by Mayor Yoder.

Present: Mayor Yoder, Aldermen: Allen, Haddock, Richardson, Tupper, and Yoder were present. City Officials present were City Manager, Deane, Director Byrnes, Attorney Kelly and Clerk Viane.

Minutes of previous meeting were approved.

Mr. William J. Horvath, representing Horvath & Associates, Inc., Real Estate Development Consultants, and Mr. Christopher Waszynski, Architect and Urban Planning Consultants, presented a plan and proposal for the improvement of the Downtown Central Business District which had previously been offered to the Planning Commission and members of the business sector. Council authorized funds and instructed the City Manager to enter into a contract with Howard L. Green & Associates.

Minutes of Other Boards were received and filed.

Mr. Norman S. Simmons, Design Director for S.S. Krueger Company, appeared on behalf of the K-Mart Store at the Town Shopping Center regarding the extension of a screening wall requested by the Planning Commission. Council referred his proposal back to the Planning Commission for review and disposition.

Permission was granted to "Lucky Oldies but Goodies", 32255 Grand River, to hold an Antique Show and Sale in the parking lot of the Village Mall either September 28th or 29th, depending upon the weather.

Official Council support was given to the United Foundation 27th Annual Torch Drive beginning Labor Day at continuing through Thursday, November 6, 1975. Letters received and filed.

Motion by Allen, supported by Tupper, to adopt the following Ordinance:

**ORDINANCE C-78-75**

**AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 130 OF CHAPTER 9 OF TITLE 1 OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON**

**THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:**

1.300 Deferred Retirement. In the event a member, who has ten (10) or more years of credited service, leaves the employ of the City prior to his voluntary retirement age, he shall be entitled to a pension upon attainment of his voluntary retirement age. The provisions of Section 1.322 which are in effect at the time of his separation from the city employment shall be used to compute the pension he is entitled to. Provided, that he does not withdraw his accumulated contributions from the members deposit fund. His said pension shall begin thirty (30) days after the date his application for same is filed with the Board of Trustees, but not prior to his attainment of his voluntary retirement age. During the period of his absence from City employment his balance in the members deposit fund shall be accumulated at regular interest.

This ordinance was introduced at a regular meeting of the Farmington City Council on August 18, 1975, was adopted and enacted at the next regular meeting of the Council on September 2, 1975 and will become effective 180 days after publication.
